- Process: The process of doing mission is as important as what we do in mission. We seek to create and strengthen relationships, foster team building among participants, be respectful of the culture of those we are helping, ensure that long-term support will continue after our involvement is ended, and that our contributions enhance the abilities of those we help and not replace them.

# Minutes of the 110th Annual Congregational Meeting St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Calgary, Alberta

# Held on Sunday, February 26, 2017

#### Attendance and Constitution:

One hundred and seventeen (117) members and adherents of St. Andrew's gathered in the sanctuary of the Church on Sunday, February 26, 2017 at 12:30 p.m. for the 110<sup>th</sup> Annual Congregational Meeting.

The Rev. Jared Miller served as Chair of the meeting and welcomed the congregation to the meeting and declared the meeting properly constituted for the conduct of business. The Rev. Miller opened the meeting with prayer.

## Congregational Announcement:

Don and Annika Koch advised the congregation of a pot luck supper, When Irish Eyes are Smiling, to be held March 11, 2017 from 5-7:30 pm in the lower hall.

Appointment of Secretary, Adoption of Agenda, Approval of Minutes and Adoption of Reports:

- 1. Moved by Dolly Forcade, seconded by Audrey Cole that John Cuthbertson be appointed Secretary for the meeting. Carried.
- 2. Moved by Mark Rowe, seconded by Debby Dorcas that further nominations cease. Carried
- 3. Moved by Audrey Cole, seconded by George Amos that the agenda be adopted as amended to include a new item 3.5 being a Session presentation by Debby Dorcas and Craig Murray. Carried
- 4. Debbie Dorcas gave a presentation from Session which updated the Search process and outlined the Tri-Ministry model. Craig Murray outlined the Resources, Responsibilities and Accountability of the Tri-Ministry model and Rev. Jan and Rev Jared then shared their views on this model.
- 5. Moved by Rene Prevost, seconded by Beth Miller that the Minutes of the 109<sup>th</sup> Annual Congregational Meeting (corrected in the agenda to reflect that is was held on Sunday, February 28, 2016) be approved as presented. Carried. These minutes appear on pages 12-14 of the 2016 Annual Report.
- 6. Just prior to the adoption of reports, Mary Anne Quesnel thanked Sheila Kirkland for 30 years of effort District Supervisor and asked the minutes of today's meeting reflect that thanks.
- 7. Moved by Audrey Cole, seconded by Caroline Bain that all reports be received and considered. Carried.
- 8. Moved by Brian Hawco, seconded by Joan Rowe that all reports without recommendations be received for information with one correction subsequently identified and to be reflected in these minutes (requested by Cathy Millar) to show that Brent Werle is a member of the Search team. Carried.

#### Financial Statements for 2016

David Townsend presented the 2016 financial report to the meeting entitling it "An Incredible Machine with Lots of Moving Parts!" He specifically thanked Dolly Forcade for her key work in the preparation of this report. He made several observations and notes:

- a. He reviewed and discussed the background leading to the decision to invest certain of the funds in a balanced portfolio fund with Mawer Investments of Calgary and noted that the Legacy Fund monies were invested separately with the PCC.
- b. On the revenue side, overall contributions were down about \$50,000 from 2015, reflecting in part, the difficult financial situation in Calgary generally. Also, investment revenues were down, in large part a reflection of the low interest rate environment.
- c. The Legacy Fund disbursed a total of \$87,000 to St. Andrew's to support the 5-year budget plan. \$15,000 went into the General Fund of the Church while the remaining \$72,000 was allocated to a designated fund for Mission and Worship and over time, these funds will be transferred to the General Fund.

There being no questions on the Balance Sheet, David reviewed the General Fund. He specifically wanted to acknowledge and thank the contributions of the Facilities Team and maintenance volunteers whose efforts were a significant factor in keeping the expenses of the church lower than they otherwise would have been. Rev. Frank Breisch commented that many of the church teams did not spend what was allocated to them and questioned whether that meant things that were budgeted did not get done. A member of the congregation, Dirk Alting, asked whether the \$250, 000 of envelope and miscellaneous revenue (line 2 under revenue on p3 of the financial statements) was based on member numbers. Rev. Jared answered this question. It is actual givings, while the budget for 2017 considers the membership.

David then discussed the Legacy Fund (p4), the Memorial Fund (p5), the South of Fish Creek Fund (p6) and the Notes to the Financials (p7).

Brian Hawco questioned whether the invested monies were secure, and David responded that they were invested with Mawer Investments in a Balanced Fund.

Moved by David Townsend, seconded by Dolly Forcade that the reviewed Financial Statements of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Calgary for the year ended December 31, 2016 be accepted. Carried.

Mary Anne Quesnel asked whether the funds not spent last year on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Minister's stipend is in a reserve fund. David Townsend advised that they were not and these savings were part of the overall expense reductions and part of the reason for the surplus.

#### 2017 Budget Presentation

Mark Rowe then gave a detailed presentation of the two budgets-the St. Andrew's General Fund Budget and the South of Fish Creek Budget (Appendix B after the 2016 Financial Statements in the 2016 Annual Report). Based on the overall budget, he asked the congregation to consider an increase in their givings this year of between 2%-5%.

At this point in the meeting, the following questions from the congregation submitted to the question box were answered.

- 1. How will the South of Fish Creek Ministry affect our mission work and efforts? Rev. Jared responded indicating that while we were blessed with extra financial resources, this doesn't necessarily translate to personnel resources, and so that will need to be a consideration in moving forward.
- 2. What is the line item for the \$7000 consulting fee? Rev. Jan responded that this was for a communication consultant to ensure that we had consistent and effective communication with respect to the search process and over all of the different vehicles of communication used at St. Andrew's. Some of these funds also relate to some executive coaching, and this consulting arrangement was, in part, proposed by the Presbytery.
- 3. Why are the Ministers' stipends not listed separately? Mark Rowe responded that there was some privacy sensitivity about putting this information in a public document and that most not for profit organizations handles it this way. That said, the information is available to those who request it. Elaine Cantlon also advised that this suggestion was under advisement.
- 4. Sylvia Shaw, the acting chair of the Personnel Team, then provided specific salary and benefit information for the office staff and the musical director.
- 5. Please outline the rationale concerning the janitorial change. Sylvia advised that the Personnel team had noted that the role had changed over the years with some functions being done by volunteers. They surveyed other churches and carefully and prayerfully considered alternatives. As a result of that process, they moved to a contract cleaning company. Furthermore, they confirmed they had considered the need for set up assistance of the facilities and older members who needed such assistance.
- 6. With respect to the contract cleaning contract, please comment on the quality and financial aspects. Sylvia Shaw advised that the church would potentially save more than \$10,000 annually. With respect to the quality and level of service, as this is a new process for the church, she requested some patience as we work through this. The office is keeping a log book of any issues and they will then liaise with the cleaning company with any issues.
- 7. Sheri Coutts had a question respecting the amounts for two line items in the budget being the amount spent in 2016 under Leading and Leader Resources and secondly, the amount budgeted for 2017 for Research (included under the Maintenance and Operations section). Rev. Jared responded and indicated that the amount spent in 2016 was with respect to the communication consultant. The Research line item concerned bringing Glenn and Sandy Smith to Calgary for the launch of phase 2 of South of Fish Creek, Rev. Jared's own research in Vancouver on missional communities in affluent neighbourhoods and other research, including upcoming SFC Transact studies or intern involvement.
- 8. John Young asked what the costs were to run the nursery and Sylvia responded with the specific information.
- 9. Jackie Moody asked who was responsible for covering the moving costs of the new minister. Mark Rowe indicated that we are bound by standard operating procedures and that St. Andrew's would bear this cost. The number in the budget is artificially low because money is held in reserve that was unused during previous moves. The \$8000 listed is the balance after the reserved amount of \$17,000 is used.

- 10. Margaret Bates indicated she and other members were concerned about the continued reduction in the music budget and given that there was a surplus, whether the 2016 amount could be restored and used in the 2017 budget. There was general discussion about the budget process and that the congregation may only approve the budget or send it back to the Session. It could not approve the type of amendment suggested.
- 11. Frank Breisch made a comment to the meeting that we need to be careful in our spending but that a vote to approve the budget was a vote by each of us to commit to the increased givings target of 2%-5%. He would offer his leadership personally to do this. One member indicated that many seniors may not be able to make that kind of increase.
- 12. Frank Breisch then moved, seconded by Dolly Forcade that "this meeting request Session ensure that any team, organization, or ministry that overspends its budget without prior Sessional approval shall have its budget for the following year reduced by the amount that was overspent."
  - There was further commentary from several members of the congregation. Brian Hawco cautioned for the need to be careful and to consider why the amount might be overspent. The opportunity to come to Session was noted favourably. Alice Post asked how funds are handled which are specifically donated to support a certain team. A few of the examples that were discussed included Side by Side, and PWS&D. Dolly Forcade explained how this worked for qualified recipients (e.g. the Food Bank) or where reserves were established (e.g. the Shingles campaign for the new roof) and the third situation where someone donates to a specific church group (e.g. Side by Side). She also emphasized that first and foremost, the funds, if they are designated, go to where there they are designated, the General fund then subsidizes the budget by the amount not designated. Further general discussion occurred. When the motion was called for a vote, 60 voted in favour of Frank Breisch's motion and 22 voted against with the result that it was carried.
- 13. George Thomson asked about the funds being budgeted for the search team. Dolly Forcade answered that these are only incurred when a search is occurring, that pulpit supply is needed (as we have a vacancy) and that relocation expenses are also incurred.
- 14. There were 3 motions made by Mark Rowe and seconded by Elaine Cantlon. These motions were to approve the Presbyterian Sharing allocation of \$40,243, to adopt the 2017 Budget and to adopt the 2017 South of Fish Creek Budget, all of which were carried.
- 15. Moved by Mark Rowe, seconded by Elaine Cantlon that:
  - a) the accepted allocation for Presbyterians Sharing in 2017 be \$40, 243;
  - b) the proposed budget for St. Andrew's General Fund for 2017 be adopted, and
  - c) the proposed budget for the South of Fish Creek Fund for 2017 as presented, be adopted. Carried.

## In Memoriam

Rev. Jared read the names of those members and adherents who were called to higher service in 2016 (see p.9 of the 2016 Annual Report). The Moderator offered a prayer in honour of those who had passed on and we recognized them.

#### **Conclusion**

One further congregant's question had been submitted and asked why there were no regularly scheduled Bible studies in the evening. Rev. Jan responded and indicated that these hadn't been well attended in the past for a variety of reasons but that the Ministers were always very open to meeting a need.

There being no further business, on motion made by Audrey Cole, seconded by Gail Prevost, the meeting concluded at 2:45.

Rev. Jan Hazlett closed the meeting with the benediction.

St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church Minutes of Congregational Meeting held November 5, 2017.

Sixty one (61) members of St. Andrew's attended the Congregational meeting held on Nov. 5, 2017 at 4:00p.m. in the Sanctuary. Rev. Jared moderated the meeting.

MOTION by Rev. Jared to appoint Jean Sadler as Clerk for the meeting. Seconded by Mark Rowe. Carried.

The Moderator stated the reason for the meeting was the need for congregational buy-in for support of changes to the ministerial model.

The Moderator led the meeting in prayer.

Kevin MacFarlane undertook a presentation including overhead slides that outlined the revised ministry position descriptions for approval along with the new associated tier structure which would be presented to Presbytery on Nov. 7 for approval. Following that the Search Team would be asked to continue searching for a minister to be a "Lead Minister" based on the accepted position descriptions.

Following brief discussion, it was confirmed Revs. Jared Miller and Jan Hazlett will have the opportunity to meet candidate(s); Presbytery Reps Revs. Jean Morris and Dianne Ollerenshaw are advisors; Jean and Dianne feel confident Presbytery would approve the change if St. Andrew's Session and congregation approve the action; Session feels we will be stronger and better off going back to the tier model of ministry; the sooner the Search Team can complete their job the sooner we could have a minister on board, there were a couple of candidates identified during the previous search who were interested in the tier model and if they are still interested we would react quickly to see if there is still interest.

MOTION by Kevin MacFarlane, Seconded by Brian Hawco THAT the Congregation of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church, Calgary, approve its Session's recommendation of a revised ministry model and associated position descriptions to reflect a tier ministry with a lead minister and two associate ministers. Carried.

Rev. Jared announced that Rev. Jan Hazlett will be taking three months leave beginning Nov. 10. There being no further business MOTION by Craig Murray, Seconded by Frank Breisch THAT the meeting be adjourned at 4:40p.m.

Members of the Session of St. Andrew's are elected and ordained to the office of Ruling Elder. With the ministers, who act as the moderator of Session, elders work as leaders—leading the congregation in its fellowship (its ministry to one another) and in its mission (its ministry to the world). Elders seek the will of God for the congregation so they can lead it in the direction they believe Jesus would have it go.

They seek to model themselves after Jesus as they listen to people and serve the church. The Session is fully accountable for actions of all teams and groups in our congregation.

We started the year with 35 Session members; with the resignation of Tom McIntyre, Brenda Pudwell, and Marlene LaMontagne, our number is now 32.

Session work is accomplished through teams whose membership includes both elders and lay people. This year teams of Session included: Christian Education, Family Ministry, Mission, Leading with Care, Ministry Resource and Accountability, Pastoral Care, Personnel, Stewardship and Planning, Welcome and Fellowship, and Worship. In addition, our Search Team continued working to fill the vacant position of Lead Minister. Here are a few Session highlights from the past year:

- Over the summer, Session supported the Facilities Team in the Sanctuary renovation and Audio-Visual upgrade, and we would like to express our heartfelt THANKS to the many volunteers who gave of their time and talents in this meaningful work.
- We have been in transition for basically four years as a congregation. In response to what we are hearing and experiencing, we invited Don McLeod, a facilitator who brings 'transition' experience and knowledge of church communities and the corporate world, to work with our Session in a fall retreat setting (Friday night and all day Saturday). Don was asked to help us think about our current reality, to help us understand what might be normative in such times, and to share actions/strategy that may be helpful to us now. This was a significant event for our Session, and one that built community and strengthened relationships, in addition to the learnings we took away from the time with Don.
- In September, Session revised the ministry model from a peer to a tier ministry model, with a lead minister and two associate ministers. A committee was struck (consisting of the Ministry Resource and Accountability Team, and the Ministry Model Review Team) to review and revise all 3 minister's position descriptions. Session met, reviewed and approved all position descriptions, a congregational meeting was called, and the congregation approved the tier model and 3 new position descriptions (Lead Minister, Associate Minister, Associate Minister), and Presbytery approved same. Our search resumed for a Lead Minister. Rev. Dr. Jean Morris and Rev. Dianne Ollerenshaw continue to work with us as presbytery representatives. Session hopes that these measures will help us be successful in our search for a new minister.
- This fall, Jared, Debby, and the office staff worked to bring on board nine people who work
  mornings twice a month as 'Hospitality Volunteers', providing front-desk assistance so that
  our office staff can concentrate on their tasks. Our thanks go to Anita Szott, Barbara

## Session Teams

#### **Christian Education Team**

The Christian Education Team (CE) is charged with the task of providing guidance and active support to life-long Christian education within the congregation. Within the Team's responsibility is the operation of the nursery, all levels of Church School, youth events and programming, adult education including Alpha & Adult Bible Study, Summer Church School, Vacation Bible School and the child, youth and adult libraries. CE oversees special interest groups such as Coffee & Conversation Bible study, and certain special events including ADVENTure, the annual Spring Fun Day, and the presentation of gifts to graduating grade 6 and 12 youth and annual teacher/leader recognition.

The 2017 Team was chaired by Rhonda Wishart and included long-standing team members Inge Murray, Debby Dorcas, Audrey Cole, Stephanie Werle, Mary Jane Curran and Kevin MacFarlane. In the fall of 2017 Stephanie Werle retired from the Team and new members, Kim McLachlan and Lucy Aburto, were welcomed. The Rev. Jan Hazlett serves as *ex officio* member.

In terms of Church School, there were two classes offered at 9:30 a.m. and one at 11:15 a.m. for the 2017 year. The 9:30 a.m. classes included one for ages 3-7 (Kingdom Kids) and the other for ages 8-11 (Faith Finders). We were delighted to successfully recruit four teams of leaders to assist with the teaching for each class. Both classes used the age-appropriate Christian Reformed curriculum, "Dwell". At 11:15 a.m., the multi-aged group of 3-11 year olds (Worship Wonders) used the "Young Children at Worship" curriculum for the spring and "Dwell" curriculum for the fall. Inge Murray blessed St. Andrew's with another year as the Coordinator of the Elementary Church School. The Church School operates with the able assistance of Church School Scheduling Coordinators including Inge Murray, Mary Jane Curran, Lorna Kearnes and Carolyn Jerrard.

As a result of very few young people in the Junior/High age group being available for Church School in 2016, Church School was not offered for that age group in 2017. Those young people who were interested in assisting with the Elementary Church School were encouraged to adopt roles as assistants to the leaders in the younger classes.

Confirmation classes, led by the Rev. Jared Miller, were offered to the youth on Sunday mornings in the spring of 2017. The CE Team is grateful for the leadership of all church leaders and helpers, including the teen helpers, who share their gifts in ministry and devote their time and energy to the young people of St. Andrew's. A list of the 2017 Church School leaders can be found at the end of this section.

Summer Church School was offered at the 9:30 a.m. service from mid-June through to early September 2017, led by the CE Team members with assistance from members of the congregation using the curriculum "One Room Church School".

In terms of Youth Ministry, the programming was led by Carolyn Jerrard under the guidance of Rev. Jared Miller. Carolyn was ably assisted by youth leaders, Shona Murray and Shelby Cole in the spring of 2017, joined by Elizabeth Kangong in the fall of 2017.

In the spring of 2017, St. Andrew's connected groups of teens and friends, who continued to regularly meet at the church on Friday nights and occasionally joined the City-wide group of Presbyterian youth. In the fall of 2017, the group met regularly on Thursday nights for the purposes of a study group with occasional Friday night special activities and events. David Kurtz, with a background in religious studies, has provided welcome assistance to the study group evenings.

In terms of the nursery, Kim McLachlan assumed the role of Nursery Coordinator in early 2017 and Deepali Gupta, who was hired as our Nursery staff person in October 2016, continues in that position. The CE Team is grateful for the volunteers who assist the nursery caregivers in providing care to our little ones when it is busy, particularly at the 9:30 a.m. service.

A Newsletter "Splash" for families of nursery aged children was continued as an additional way of connecting families to St. Andrew's.

The CE Team is blessed by the presence of Sylvia Shaw who continued in the role of Adult Library Coordinator in 2017, purchasing and cataloguing current and relevant reading material for the benefit of the congregation. With Sylvia's encouragement, we saw renovations to our Adult Library space that improved appearance and efficiency in the library space in the Karl English Lounge. The renovations were carried out, with much gratitude from CE, by Lorne Kelly.

CE is grateful for the leadership of Bill Judd in the 9:30 a.m. Adult Bible Study programme offered at that service.

The CE Team plans and organizes the annual presentation of gifts to our graduating grade 6 and 12 students – and these presentations were made on Christian Family Sunday in May 2017.

CE organized the annual Spring Fun Day for the young in age and young at heart in April 2017, welcoming a petting zoo from Butterfield Acres.

The festive informal family celebration of ADVENTure took place in late November with a musical being led by Debby Dorcas during morning services, involving Church School children and a keen group of adults with aspirations in musical theatre. The event included cookie decorating and holiday beverages for families between the services.

The St. Andrew's Youth Scholarship, administered by the CE Team, was awarded to two students in 2017 – Abel Mohan and Douglas Henrichsen – Abel is studying engineering at the University of Toronto, and Douglas has deferred his studies until 2018.

CE's mission funds for 2017 were directed in the name of the Church School children to purchase Christmas gifts for teenage children to be distributed by the Salvation Army; and to maintaining the relationship with the Church School's foster child through the Christian Children's Fund of Canada.

The CE Team manages to stay on track in terms of budget, largely due to the oversight and direction of Debby Dorcas, Team Treasurer.

The CE Team can only accomplish the work it is called to do by the continuing response of members of the congregation to serve in teaching and leadership roles. We are very appreciative of all who assist in the work of Christian Education at St. Andrew's.

# Family Ministry Team

The Family Ministry Team was formed early in 2016 under the leadership of The Rev. Jared Miller. Members of the team include Stephanie Werle as Convener, Craig Murray, Bart Stolee and Carolyn Jerrard (focus on Youth Ministry).

## Family Ministry Team Mandate

The purpose of the Family Team Ministry is to nourish a rich and family friendly worship environment, while developing programmes that connect faith to life at home and the church, with the world beyond the boundaries of Sunday morning services.

The Family Ministry Team is responsible for:

- 1. Recognizing that families are under-represented in both church membership and church life and serve an advocacy function in that respect;
- 2. Informing Session what the current and ever-changing needs of families are, and what the church can do to be effective in ministering to families,
- 3. Arranging programming that connects the church with families who are not currently part of our faith family, with an eye toward the area south of Fish Creek,
- 4. Oversight of youth and children ministry activities that do not take place within the current parameters of the Christian Education Team,
- 5. Other responsibilities as Session directs, and
- 6. To prepare a brief review of yearly activities for the Annual Report.

The membership of this Team is to consist of:

- i) Minister responsible for Family Ministry (ex officio),
- ii) One active ruling Elder with an interest in Family Ministry,
- iii) Three to four parents of young children, balanced between mother(s) and father(s)

This year we spent time getting to know our young families and young adult members. We have worked on building community among our members through various social events aimed at men, women, young adults, couples, families and intergenerational opportunities such as:

- Men's Night Out regular night of playing pool, whisky tasting
- Ladies' Night Out coffee night, walking at the Glenmore Reservoir, Paint Night with Liza Fuenning, Shakespeare in the Park, book discussion with Anna Braun
- Adults Only Night Fire Pit Party, adult only night at Telus Spark
- Family Events sledding at Park 96, picnic at Lake Sundance, camping at Kinbrook Island.
- Mission Salvation Army Toy Warehouse volunteer opportunity for families to build toy hampers.

In 2018, we will be expanding our focus to offer more opportunities for faith building and mission work, along with continuing to offer social events to build friendships among members. In January, we will be moving into Phase II of our South of Fish Creek work. Our goal is to see a great intergenerational community at St. Andrew's and beyond, that is vibrant and filled with young people seeking God and living out His Word.

Volunteer Alberta, who oversees the Police Check system, has gone through numerous changes over the last eighteen months. They now have an on-line system for completing police checks. If you are due for a new police check, please contact the office for the needed letter of introduction and process instructions. We will also be contacting volunteers who need a police check.

We held a fire drill during both worship services on Sunday, May 21, 2017. We are required to hold one every three years. Overall, the drill went smoothly, and all were evacuated in record time. Everyone is reminded to be aware of all fire exits, so in the event of a real emergency, you know your quickest exit route.

#### Ministry Model Review Team

The Session of St. Andrew's formed a Ministry Model Review Team (MMRT) at its April Session meeting following a recommendation from the Search Team which had been seeking a new Minister, Vision and Direction. Based upon their search experiences over the prior year, the Search Team unanimously recommended Session review the Peer Model. Consequently, this committee was established by Session to make recommendations for possible changes to our Ministry Model. The MMRT established by Session consisted of five elders (two from Search Team) and our two Presbytery Representatives:

Kevin MacFarlane Rhonda Wishart (Search)

Cathy Millar (Search) Jean Morris (Presbytery Representative)

Inge Murray Dianne Ollerenshaw (Presbytery Representative)

The Ministry Model Review Team held many meetings. The process commenced with extensive examination of St. Andrew's core values and what is of most importance to us as a congregation. Between those full group meetings, members of the team conducted interviews with a total of nine ministers who have been involved in ministry in either The Presbyterian Church in Canada or in The Presbyterian Church USA, including Rev. Jan Hazlett and Rev. Jared Miller.

Some interviews were focused on the origin of the present peer model of ministry as well as the advantages or disadvantages of the model versus any alternative model. Other interviews involved an examination of the possibility that "Interim Ministry" would be a suitable alternative for St. Andrew's at this time. A document presented to the 2008 General Assembly entitled "Multiple-Minister Congregations" was helpful in the discussions. Once the MMRT reviewed feedback from this broad group, it developed the recommendation that Session revise the ministry model to reflect a tier ministry with a lead minister and two associate ministers.

The MMRT then joined with the Ministry Resource and Accountability Team, in consultation with Rev. Jan Hazlett and Rev. Jared Miller, to review and revise the position name and description for the present Minister, Vision and Direction to reflect a lead position, and make accompanying adjustments to the two associate position descriptions as required. The revised descriptions were brought back to and approved by Session at the October Session Meeting. The Search process is now proceeding based on those revised descriptions.

#### Mission Team

The Mission Team meets once per month on the fourth Tuesday night, except July and December. Current members of the Team are: Joan Rowe (Convener); Rev. Jared Miller (Resource Minister); Bill Judd, Loran McVittie, Brent Harding, Beth Miller, Carolyn Jerrard, Kathy Slimmon, Kerrie Slimmon, Carol Doyle, Brian Hawco, Pat Tritter, and Duane Tritter.

Our focus continues to be providing missional opportunities for our congregation to the local community, national and international projects. We have determined that projects would include a balance of: local and global; hands-on and advocacy; fundraising and direct involvement; and attempt to involve people of all ages. This year we have provided opportunities to support:

<u>Coldest Night of the Year Walk (Beth Miller):</u> St. Andrew's team, *Walking Humbly*, was part of this year's Coldest Night of the Year Walk. Our team of 14 had groups that walked either 2 km or 5 km. Many congregants also contributed financially to this fundraiser. The proceeds go to support Bankview Apartments, Feed the Hungry, and the Mustard Seed. In total there were 63 Calgary Teams, 447 walkers, and \$101,483 raised to reduce homelessness in Calgary.

<u>Mission Trips outside of Calgary</u>: This year, Jayne Martin from our congregation went on a YWAM-Mexico build.

## <u>Little Dresses and Little Britches for Africa (Judie Coleman)</u>

"This project helps support a non-profit Christian organization providing relief to children in Africa and beyond". More than 800 little dresses and pairs of shorts were sewn by members and friends of the St. Andrew's congregation. They were distributed through Disaster Aid Canada to Ukraine, the Philippines and other countries. Members of our congregation took them to orphanages in Haiti and Rwanda. We are thankful for everyone who participated in this mission project by sewing, organizing, or delivering and through monetary support. This project has reached the end of its life cycle in our community and the last kits are finished. It will no longer be included as a project of Mission Team. Additional donations totaling \$270 have been forwarded to Disaster Aid Canada.

Heritage Food Bank Depot (Bill Judd and Liza Fuenning): The Heritage Food Bank Depot moved from an idea to reality in late 2017. In partnership with the Calgary Food Bank and with participation of a neighbouring congregation of B'nai Tikvah, we have established a depot where needy Calgarians can access food support. Our easy-to-access location in southwest Calgary is open on Saturdays. We are the only Calgary Food Bank Location open on Saturdays, which gives added importance to this already important food stability effort. Liza Fuenning, Bill Judd, and John Zyto (B'nai Tikvah) are coordinating this effort with the added help of approximately 50 volunteers from our two congregations. The depot is open on a weekly basis and has already been showing its value with people coming to our location who might not otherwise be able to access the central Food Bank and offering added convenience for those located in the south of Calgary. While it is a significant effort to receive and re-distribute the amount of food that the Calgary Food Bank gives to each client, the work is most worthwhile when we hear the stories of what this help means to the clients. With a few months of operating experience, the processes and sensitivities of this work are becoming better understood. We look forward to being even more help to hungry families in 2018 as the programme expands.

<u>Healing and Reconciliation (Brian Hawco):</u> Reconciliation is an often-misunderstood word. Its meaning is 'The restoration of friendly relations'. There were two 'Aboriginal Awareness' evenings (March and September) each attended by about 30 people. The general theme for these awareness evenings was "Reconciliation in the Urban Community".

Evening topics have included historical perspectives, personal stories related to residential school life, a video about reconciliation within a town in Saskatchewan, the Blanket Exercise, a history of treaties, a drumming circle and question and answer periods. Brian has created personal links with the Aboriginal Friendship Center for information and speakers and accessed important resources from The Presbyterian Church in Canada. St. Andrew's Legacy Fund provided \$500 toward honouraria for six speakers/participants.

<u>Camp Kannawin (Carol Doyle)</u>: Camp Kannawin has ongoing needs for upkeep and support. Churches in Presbytery receive updates in the spring about needs anticipated for the camp's opening. In 2017, \$250 from St. Andrew's General Fund and \$250 from the South of Fish Creek Fund (meant to support Family Ministry) was forwarded to address needs for replacement mattresses. We published some of the smaller wish list items that could be donated. Mission Team was asked to include Camp Kannawin in its budget for 2018 as it does not fit neatly in any of the teams.

<u>Veteran's Food Bank (Joan Rowe):</u> Six shopping carts full of food were donated by members of the congregation during the four-week collection project and were dropped off at the local Legion. There was also \$3,080 in envelope donations.

<u>NeighbourLink (Joan Rowe):</u> The Team decided not to continue with 'No Crib for a Bed' this year. NeighbourLink is difficult to contact now and has little information available of its hours of operation or available programmes. Instead, the Team agreed to focus on the "Mitten Tree" collection.

Mitten Tree Collection (Kerrie Slimmon and Kathy Slimmon): A BIG thank-you to everyone who contributed to the Mitten Tree collection this year. We surpassed last year's collection with 317 items in total (compared to 251 items last year). The items included socks, mittens/gloves, hats/headbands/earmuffs, scarves, blankets, and one pair of winter boots, a bath kit and 2 hair accessories. This year, most items were socks with 102 pairs of men's socks, 21 women's and 10 children's pairs. The men's items have been given to the Drop-in Centre; the women's and children's items were given to the Sheriff King Home. The children's items were donated to the Women's Shelter this year because they reported having over 30 children at the Centre who were without winter items! The Legacy Fund was accessed for Mission Team to purchase a new artificial Christmas tree for St. Andrew's as the old one was unstable.

<u>Claire Building/Acadia Place/A Place to Call Home/Kairos/CUPS/CHF (Bill Judd):</u> Our support is multi-faceted ranging from site projects, community-building events with the residents, one-on-one conversational support, and distribution of furniture and household items. Bill Judd continues to lead by his presence in and around the building and participation in Kairos volunteer meetings. Ralph Morris has become a regular at Wednesday morning breakfasts/coffee. Highlights this year include: participating in the Coldest Night of the Year fundraiser and Homelessness Awareness Event; assisting residents to plant a vegetable garden with the produce going toward their community suppers; helping with a Christmas party and dinner; and donations for Christmas presents (special thanks go to the Heritage Seniors for their donations of gifts for children).


This year we received \$5,000 from the Legacy Fund to help meet the critical need for new, clean beds. To date, \$2,750 has been spent on seven beds with more coming in soon. We have been able to stretch the funds by partnering with Springwall Sleep Products for wholesale pricing and using volunteer labour for delivery of the beds. Some of the beds have gone to new tenants who start out with practically nothing, and some have gone to those who have acquired infested or worn-out bedding that needed to be replaced. Based on experience of move-in needs, we see that we have made a helpful, solid start into what continues to be a substantial city-wide problem. Special thanks to the delivery crew of Loran McVittie, Sean Pepper and Ed Braun.

<u>Foodgrains/Presbyterian World Service (Loran McVittie):</u> The Concert "Common Vision-Spring into Song" for the Canadian Foodgrains Bank (CFGB) was held on June 10. Two hundred and fourteen tickets were sold, plus additional donations. The Ladies Guild donated an additional \$2,000. A total of \$13,221.25 was raised for the Foodgrains Bank, after expenses. Expenses for the event were \$698.75 (\$400 musicians, \$223.45 sound system supplies, \$75.30 for flowers).

With the multiplying effect from the Canadian Government matching funds, a total of \$66,106,25 from this effort at St. Andrew's will go to the Canadian Foodgrains Bank to address world hunger! The government match is 4:1, which produces \$5 for the CFGB (or \$1 plus \$4 of regular government funding). Thank you to all who participated and helped in so many ways. Additional thanks to Loran McVittie and Cody Obst.

We thank the congregation for their participation with time, talents and financial supports of the many mission activities arising from St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church. St. Andrew's is growing as a 'missional church'. We hope that you continue to follow updates on mission service projects through the website, bulletin boards, video announcement loop, bulletin inserts and News from the Pews.

#### Pastoral Care's District Visitors Team

The District Visitor Team is part of the Pastoral Care Ministry. Members and adherents of St. Andrew's are all part of a district that is served by a Visitor. We currently have 52 districts. A phone district was created this year, with one visitor contacting the families in the district via a phone call.

This year the District Visitor Team has been reviewing the current District Visitor system and has begun some re-organization to be responsive to meeting the changing needs of our congregation. In November 2017, the District Visitor Team made a recommendation to the Session of St. Andrew's to discontinue the use of communion cards in 2018. This recommendation was approved.

The Team would like to thank all the Visitors for their time, commitment and dedication to this ministry at St. Andrew's.

## Pastoral Care's Hospital Visitors & Hospice Palliative Volunteers

The mandate of our Hospital Visitors' Ministry is "to provide spiritual care for the people of St. Andrew's Church who are being treated in Calgary hospitals."

St. Andrew's hospital visitors are part of the spiritual care organization of the Calgary hospitals. Consequently, our visitors are required to complete the training program approved by the hospital, be admitted into their volunteer care program, and comply with the regulations pertaining to this program. The cost of this training is covered by St. Andrew's.

Our volunteers try to visit anyone who has registered themselves as Presbyterian and especially visit those from St. Andrew's. The ministers also visit those who are in any of the Calgary hospitals. This year we had three lay hospital visitors. Arlene Young and Linda Burton-Chalmers visited at Rockyview General Hospital. Jayne Martin, a new member of our team, visited at the South Health Campus. We are thankful for their dedication to this ministry.

Many times, it is the hospital visitor who discovers that a person from our congregation has been admitted. It would help us to make timely visits if we are aware when our people are admitted to hospital, so we make the following requests: If possible, when being admitted to hospital, ensure you are listed as Presbyterian, so your name appears on the Presbyterian Visitors' List. Also, if you or someone you know is admitted to the hospital, please pass on this information to one of the ministers or the church office. The hospital lists patients by their first name so if you are known by your middle name it is important that the Church office has your first name on file, so we are able to visit you!

If you identify that someone needing medical attention during a service, please raise your hand to indicate to the Minister that assistance is needed.

During this year, the Team has provided ongoing inspection and maintenance for the automated external defibrillator and for all the first aid kits. A second wheelchair was purchased specifically for use in the sanctuary.

In 2016, the number of participants typically ranged between five and seven. Overall, ten families living with dementia have taken part in this fellowship in 2017.

Side by Side takes place every Wednesday from 9:45 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. The day's activities include light exercise, a creative time, and a devotion time. Each week there is social time over refreshments as well as a light lunch. In May 2017, Music Therapy was increased from bi-weekly to weekly. Funding for the additional sessions was funded by a private donor until September 2017, and in October 2017, a grant from the Legacy Fund enabled the additional sessions to continue. Music is a very important part of our ministry and fellowship, so the increased funding is impactful and much appreciated!!

The Side by Side ministry continues to be carried out by a team of caring and dedicated volunteers who have answered the call to care for and appreciate people living with dementia. Those living with dementia also bring their own unique characteristics to the programme, helping out as able, and sharing their capacity for joy. Together, we have shared in fellowship, and have also been able to share in mission projects to benefit our community.

Many, many thanks to each person who has contributed to Side by Side this year, whether through volunteering on Wednesdays, baking, contributing financially, or praying for this ministry. A special thank you to the NOTEables who shared their beautiful music with us in the spring and at Christmas. Each contribution is vital and is part of the work God is doing through this ministry. Thank you for your faithfulness! Please keep Side by Side in your prayers as we continue to reach out to our local community and as we work to encourage new Side by Side programmes.

#### Personnel Team

The team is mandated to be responsible for the following:

Assisting the Minister, Vision and Direction in ensuring that adequate position descriptions, outlining roles and responsibilities are prepared and maintained for all non-clergy staff;

Being available to hear and address work-related issues from any of the paid non-clergy staff of the church;

Ensuring that a system for performance review is established and that reviews for nonclergy and contracted workers are conducted annually; Acting in an advisory capacity regarding salaries and benefits;

Being responsible for recruitment of non-clergy staff;

Creating and managing documentation outlining St. Andrew's Guidelines and Practices for employment;

Being aware of all current policies, laws and guidelines relating to employment from The Presbyterian Church in Canada or other levels of government or their agencies.

Throughout 2017, due to the vacancy in the position of Minister, Vision and Direction, Rev. Jan Hazlett provided support and leadership to the team and we extend our thanks to her.

The safety of our staff is paramount and to this end a set of Office Safety Guidelines was developed and introduced to the office staff during the year. These guidelines will ensure that expectations regarding working in a safe manner are clearly communicated and can be measured.

A change was made to our building cleaning services early in the year and since that time Britech Janitorial Services has provided cleaning services to meet our needs. The responsibility for the cleaning contract now rests with the Facilities Team, and Rhonda Mullan, Office Manager, is the contact for any concerns regarding the level of cleanliness in our building.

Deepali Gupta continued to provide continuity of care to our little ones in the nursery throughout the year and we are grateful for Deepali's willingness and flexibility in meeting our changing needs as the times of our worship services were adjusted during the summer and over the Christmas and New Year holiday period.

#### Search Team

The Search Team continued conducting interviews for the Minister, Vision & Direction position in the early months of 2017. While we were not in a position to offer a candidate the opportunity to preach for a call, we did learn a lot about ourselves as a congregation during those interviews and subsequent conversations. As a result, the Search Team slowly came to the realization that Session needed to conduct a thorough review of the ministry model that was currently in place. In May the Search Team went to Session with a recommendation to review the current Peer Ministry model. That motion passed and a Ministry Model Review Team (MMRT) was subsequently established by Session consisting of five elders plus our two Presbytery Representatives.

The MMRT met many times between May – August and following extensive research, interviews, and self-reflection in terms of the values St. Andrew's holds dear, the Team was unanimous in reaching its conclusion that the vision and mission of St. Andrew's would best be served by a tier ministry model with a Lead Minister and two Associate Ministers.

The MMRT reported to Session on Tuesday, September 5, recommending that Session approve a ministry model with a Lead Minister and two Associate Ministers. There was good discussion and both ministers fully participated in that discussion. The recommendation passed, and a joint committee was established to revise the 3 position descriptions to accurately reflect the tiered

ministry model. The MMRT met several times with the three elders serving on the Ministry Resource and Accountability Team and presented the revised position descriptions to Session at the October meeting. All three were approved.

A meeting was held on Sunday November 5 for the congregation to approve Session's recommendation of a revised ministry model (tier model) with a Lead Minister position and two Associate Minister positions. The meeting was very well attended and there was good discussion. That decision was approved by Presbytery the following week.

The Search Team was excited to get back to work and in late November held its first meeting since the decision was made by the congregation to call a Lead Minister. Another meeting was held in mid-December and further interviews of candidates have taken place since the beginning of January.

In the fall, due to the very significant and ongoing time commitment, every member of the Search Team was given the opportunity to re-commit to the search process. As a result, three members from the original 2016 Search Team made the decision to step aside after close to 1-1/2 years of service, and we sincerely thank them for their dedication and hard work: Yvonne Kangong, John Young and Jennifer Stolee. We also wish to acknowledge the following members of the Search Team for their continuing faithful support: Rhonda Wishart, Brent Werle, Marlyn Townsend, Sylvia Shaw, Paul Rowe, Cathy Millar, Hugh McFadzean, Loran McVittie, Bob Fuenning and Shelby Cole. The team is grateful for the contribution of its newest member, Kevin MacFarlane, who recently joined the team. The Reverends Dianne Ollerenshaw and Jean Morris continue to serve as our Presbytery Representatives and we can't thank them enough for their sincere commitment to the search process and the exceptional guidance and support they have provided from the very beginning. We cannot begin to express the depth of our gratitude to them both!

As we begin 2018, we wish to thank the congregation for your patience and for the great trust you have placed in us. It is a tremendous responsibility and we thank God for equipping us for this task and enabling us to keep putting one foot in front of the other to move us forward. We ask for your prayers as the Holy Spirit continues to guide us on this journey together.

#### The Investment Group

The Investment Group is responsible for the church's various investment portfolios held within The Presbyterian Church in Canada, Q Trade and the Mawer Investment Management Ltd. Early in 2017, the closing out of the Q Trade accounts were completed and the church's investments were consolidated with Mawer Investments.

The use of a single fund manager will simplify the office administration compared to the three accounts. Separate sub-accounts with the Mawer portfolio account ensure that any identified segregation requirements are being preserved. It also provides an advantage of daily reporting ability with flexible withdrawal capability. It also assists in the church's cash management.

The Legacy fund continues to be managed by the Legacy Fund committee which is independent of the Investment Group.

The Memorial Fund is invested as a separate sub-account with the Mawer portfolio and continues to be ably administered by Alex Grant.

Projects undertaken during the year included a new roof on the sanctuary, new northwest exit doors, relocation and installation of fire door between Trinity Hall and Inner Hall, installation of a new south window in the sanctuary and redevelopment of the chancel under the able leadership of Tom McIntyre.

The upgrade of the sanctuary and chancel included replacement of incandescent and fluorescent lighting with more economical LED lighting. Funding for the chancel renovation came from the Memorial and Legacy Funds with considerable savings from volunteer labour throughout the summer.

Installation of the south window included stained glass through generous individual donations. Additional projects included the upgrading of electrical circuits in Kitchen and Inner Hall, construction of a dedicated storage closet for sanctuary sound equipment, repairs to the church sign and ongoing repairs to the south wall stucco due to damage caused by birds.

Facilities group also undertook many maintenance tasks during 2017 including a makeover of the east stairwell, repainting of Inner Hall, repairing and replacement of lighting at multiple locations, waxing of floors throughout the building, carpet cleaning in the foyer, repair to chairs and to the chair storage rack, repairs to sinks and toilets throughout the facility, removal of graffiti, and repairs to the asphalt in the parking lot.

Exterior improvements included planting of lilac bushes and tidying up the shed area.

Contracts were negotiated for snow removal and snow plowing. A review of rates for facility use will be presented to Session in spring of 2018.

Thank you to Facilities group members for their dedication and time given generously during the year, and to the many unnamed volunteers who contributed their time and talents.

## Flowers/Flower Calendar

What is the story behind the flowers in the church?

Flowers are used to symbolize many occasions in the Church. Most often, they are used to cheer our lives during difficult times. Sometimes, they are used to say thank you to people or to celebrate occasions such as special anniversaries and birthdays.

How are the flowers used in the church?

During each Sunday service, the flowers are placed at the front of the sanctuary. In addition, the Sunday bulletin will identify the name(s) of those who purchased the flowers and for what occasion, if desired.

How do I participate?

In the Karl English Lounge, there is a "Flower Calendar". Print your name beside the appropriate date when you wish to place flowers in the sanctuary. Below the calendar is a form to fill out to indicate your wishes regarding whether you will take the flowers home, or if you would like them given to someone else. Leave the completed form in the office.

How much do the flowers cost?

The flowers are purchased at a cost of \$35.00 per arrangement. Cheques are made payable to "St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church" with "flowers" on the memo line. If you wish to purchase the flowers from another florist and deliver them yourself, please notify the church office.

May I just make a donation?

As an alternative, individuals can make a donation to the St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church Memorial Fund.

May I take the flowers home after the service?

Yes, just advise the church office of your intentions.

What happens to the flowers if I don't take them home?

The flowers will be delivered to individuals who are ill, shut-in, or just need some cheer in their lives.

Who makes this all happen?

First and foremost, the individuals who purchase the flowers. The office does the ordering, and the flowers are picked up at the florist and delivered to the church by Olive Schwab. Church Elders or District Visitors deliver the flowers after the 11:15 a.m. service, when required.

The various speakers, musicians, and entertainment following our monthly luncheons provide cultural and entertainment value to all those who participate. We would like to encourage all members and interested guests to come to these luncheons. We need your support as the numbers each month vary depending on weather, road conditions, illness, etc. Tickets must be purchased by the Thursday prior to the lunch date. This Christmas, in honour of Canada 150, we offered our Christmas Luncheon Celebration to our Members for a reduced cost of only \$15.00. At these monthly luncheons, we also provide birthday cake for all those members who are celebrating birthdays during that month. We send cards to members who are ill or bereaved just to let them know we are thinking of them. These things are much appreciated by those who receive them.

#### Sound Board

The sanctuary sound equipment was completely upgraded in 2017 into a new AV (Audio-Visual) system as part of the chancel renovations project. The new system allows sending both audio and video of the services to televisions in the nursery and foyer. It also allows recording both audio and video for posting to the church web site.

The system is housed in a beautiful new cabinet made from the old choir pews by Lorne Kelly. A new 24 channel sound mixer replaced the old 16 channel mixer and allows for tailoring the output sound to various outputs: the main sanctuary speakers, a choir speaker, an assisted listening system, and to the nursery and foyer's televisions.

A new overhead projector above the pulpit area sends video to the new movie style screen on the front wall. This system is much brighter than the old projector and allows for displaying full motion video as well as slide shows. A new television camera on the back wall sends video of the sanctuary to a video mixer and computer in the AV cabinet. The computer also controls the slide show and other video sent to the projector and screen.

We are always looking for new people to help run the AV system, so if you think you would enjoy pushing buttons on high tech equipment, please talk to one of the operators.

The biggest accomplishment for 2017 was installation of a new audio video system in the sanctuary as part of the overall chancel renovations. After establishing needs and wishes with the various stakeholder groups in the church, we obtained proposals from several vendors. We contracted with Inland AV to provide the system.

Lorne Kelly did a wonderful job crafting the new larger cabinet from the old choir pews that were removed as part of the renovation.

The new system includes a camera at the back of the sanctuary to allow sending live video of services to the television in the foyer and to a new television in the nursery. This allows people who cannot remain in the sanctuary to still be part of the services.
