Journey to Easter

Raymond Kolbe was born the son of a poor weaver in Poland in 1894. At the age of 16 he became a Franciscan and took the name Maximilian. He taught seminary and built a community of brothers just west of Warsaw, which eventually housed 762 Franciscan brothers. He also went to Asia for a time where he founded communities in Japan and India. Before the Second World War, he returned to Poland.

When Germany invaded Poland in 1939, Kolbe was imprisoned briefly. He later returned to the monastery, where he and the others began to organize a shelter for 3000 Polish refugees, among whom were 2000 Jews. They housed, fed and clothed them, sacrificing all of their resources to provide for them until the Nazis closed it down and took Maximilian and four companions to the death camp at Auschwitz, where they worked with the other prisoners.

Prisoners at Auschwitz were slowly and systematically starved, and their pitiful rations were barely enough to sustain a child. Maximilian Kolbe, however, regularly stood aside for others in spite of the personal ravages of starvation. A doctor wrote, "I can say with certainty that during my four years in Auschwitz, I never saw such a sublime example of the love of God and one's neighbour." At night Kolbe pleaded with his fellow prisoners to forgive their persecutors and to overcome evil with good. When he was beaten by the guards, he never cried out. Instead, he prayed for his tormentors and constantly sacrificed himself for the others.

In order to discourage escapes, Auschwitz had a rule that if a man escaped, ten men would be killed in retaliation. In July, 1941 a man from Kolbe's bunker escaped. "You will all pay for this," the commandant screamed, "Ten of you will be locked in the starvation bunker without food or water until they die." The ten were selected, including Franciszek Gajowniczek, who cried, "My poor wife and children! What will they do?" It was then that Maximilian stepped silently forward, took off his cap, and stood before the commandant and said, "I am a Catholic priest. Let me take his place. I am old. He has a wife and children." The commandant remained silent for a moment and then agreed. Gajowniczek later recalled, "I could only thank him with my eyes. I was stunned and could hardly grasp what was going on. The immensity of it: I, the condemned, am to live and someone else willingly and voluntarily offers his life for me - a stranger. I was saved." This one event completely reshaped the rest of Gajowniczek's life in the pattern of sacrificial love.

Holy Week is the life-shaping story of our salvation where, through the cross, Jesus, in love, steps forward and takes our place — that we might be forgiven and set free. We know through the story of Holy Week just how deeply loved we are by God. Jesus says, "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you; abide in my love"(John 15:9). We have been created by God with love, for love, to love.

Won't you commit to joining me as we meet for worship through Holy Week - Maundy Thursday at 7PM, Good Friday at 11AM and on Easter Sunday, 7AM, 9:30AM or 11:15AM - and allow this amazing story of love and grace to reshape our lives according to the pattern of sacrificial love, and gratitude and hope!

I was 27 years old during the winter of 1968/1969, fifty years ago. Flemming and I were living in N.W. Calgary, having moved from Toronto in 1967. In the middle of one of those nights, we were both sound asleep, and our infant daughter slept peacefully in the next bedroom. I awoke and saw our bedroom bathed in light, and a young man standing near the end of our bed on Flemming's side. He was dressed in a brown robe and was just standing there smiling down at me. I didn't scream or jump up or grab Flemming, because the room was not just filled with light, but also filled with peace, love and complete serenity. Neither of us

spoke, as he kept smiling kindly down at me. I closed my eyes for a couple of seconds, and when I opened them He was still there.

my normal response to something so impossibly different. I merely closed my eyes and went to sleep. The next

morning, I related this ethereal event to my husband. He remembers me telling him in a calm way everything I had seen. We both marvelled at this appearance. I don't know why it happened, I only know it did. All through the years since, I have thought of it as a blessing. An amazing hint of what is to come.

The feeling I experienced in that room will stay with me for the rest of my life. Then, when that is finished, I will spend eternity in the presence of my Lord. The peace and love will never end.

An Easter People

You might have heard the phrase, “we’re an Easter people.” Some of what that implies for Christians is that we are called to live with hope and transformation, knowing that there’s no place we go where God has not already gone before us. If we look at the biblical texts leading up to Jesus’ death and resurrection, we come across stories of Jesus doing ordinary things like eating with others, and we also read about great acts of servanthood like washing the disciples’ feet. But when we look closer we can also see Jesus pleading with God in Gethsemane, we see betrayal by one of Jesus’ closest friends, and we read about many of the other disciples deserting and fleeing at Jesus’ most challenging time. Fear, betrayal, loneliness, death – these are some of the things Jesus experienced in His last days before the Resurrection. Easter changes everything! The disciples are given another opportunity to draw near and carry on Jesus’ ministry; they become “Easter people” filled with such hope and transformation, going from abandoning Jesus to giving up everything else in order to carry on His ministry.

Part of pastoral care means walking alongside of people in their lives – from ordinary moments like sharing meals and enjoying each other’s company to journeying along times of loneliness and fear, sometimes even those days or weeks leading up to the death of a loved one. Easter does not deny that suffering and death take place, but rather offers hope and transformation when things seem darkest, when things seem hopeless. Practicing pastoral care can seem like a daunting task – and to be quite honest it absolutely can be difficult at times – but we do not do this alone. We remember that there is no place we go where God has not already gone before us, and we remember that God continues to accompany us as we walk with each other. Like Jesus’ disciples, we too are invited to join in Christ’s ministry of healing and wholeness. We all have spiritual gifts that vary in kind and form, but taking time to listen and to be present with someone is something that we can all do. Whether life is going extremely well, not so great, or just kind of ordinary, God is still with us and I pray that we will take the time to be present for each other as well. May we be hopeful and open to transformation wherever we find ourselves on life’s journey, may we be “Easter people.”

Task Force on Renewal

Have you ever been asked or tried to put into words what our vision is at St. Andrew's? It can be challenging to articulate our vision clearly and succinctly and while we may all have some common thoughts, we no doubt have some different ones, and we may express ourselves differently.

Session has been seeking clarity regarding the vision of St. Andrew's and in fact, one of the mandates given to the Search Team for the Lead Minister, was to include as criteria, that of experience in the reVisioning process. The Rev. Dr. Tim has successfully steered several congregations through a reVisioning process, and in fact, the subject of Dr. Tim's doctorate was Vision and Congregational Vitality. In this regard, Session created a Renewal Task Force which began meeting in 2019. With the guidance of Dr. Tim, the Task Force will develop a

reVisioning process for St. Andrew's which will involve everyone in a variety of steps and forms of engagement, including reading material, sermons, reflection and small group discussion. More information on the process and timing will be forthcoming in the coming months.

The Task Force will also be involved in examining Leadership and Structure at St. Andrew's with a view to recommending more effective and efficient models for governance at Session and in interaction and reporting among staff, teams and the congregation. The members of the Task Force have been reading several books to assist us in our thinking on this journey, including *Inside the Large Congregation* by Susan Beaumont and *Governance and Ministry, Rethinking Board Leadership* by Dan Hotchkiss.

The Task Force, under the leadership of Dr. Tim, includes Rev. Jared, Rhonda Wishart, Cathy Millar, Craig Murray, Lynn Judd, Kevin MacFarlane, Debby Dorcas and David Platt. We, the members of the Task Force, are enthused about this journey and its possibilities for St. Andrew's! Please feel free to ask questions of any member of the Task Force.

Finding Epimenides

“When you connect on your terms, it’s Colonialism. When you connect on their terms, it’s Mission.” - Anonymous

As the Apostle Paul was making his way across the Greek world, he found himself in Athens, a city with temples dedicated to every god. Ever the shrewd missionary, Paul looked around and asked himself where he saw God already at work in the lives of Athenians. He proceeded to commend them for all the ways they were so obviously religious, and then quoted lines from the rock stars of his day, the poets Epimenides and Aratus. You can read the whole account in Acts 17.

Where is our Areopagus? Over the next few months we’re going to use this space to take a look at some of the ways our world is surprisingly religious, and how the culture around us actually creates space for us to talk about Jesus.

The Good Place

The Good Place is a sitcom about four unlikely friends who wake up one morning and find out that they’ve all died. A professor of moral philosophy, an Heiress who raised billions for charity, a Buddhist Monk, and an every-girl from Arizona all wake up and are told they’ve arrived in the Good Place; a community with frozen yogurt on every block and where all your wishes are granted. It doesn’t sound like typical fodder for a sitcom pretense, and it probably wouldn’t be until you learn that Eleanor knows she isn’t supposed to be there; that somehow she switched spots with someone who had the same name and died at the same moment. The show hangs on whether or not she is going to pull off a scam for eternity.

Spoiler Alert It’s REALLY hard to talk about what makes this show great without spoiling the crux of it. **If you want**

to be surprised, go watch Season 1 on Netflix and then come back. I’ll wait.

The first season ends with the revelation that the four of them have been in the bad place all along. The moral philosopher obsessed over every choice, paralyzed by indecision and unable to add any real value to the world; the heiress raised money for charity to draw attention to herself. The Monk was actually a thief from Florida who stumbled into the Monk scam, and Eleanor’s secret was up the whole time.

This is the backdoor through which the Gospel enters. A twist, meant to keep the show moving, actually stumbles into what the Church has been teaching for two thousand years: you can be good, be moral, be ignorant or be self-centred – but none of it is going to earn you a ticket into the good place; none of it is going to get you where you want to be. The four characters are typologies, caricatures of the way we try and live our lives every day. It’s the Breakfast Club effect: we are all a little moral, a little good, a little ignorant and a little selfish; and that’s what makes Jesus’ message so compelling. We can be good without God, but we can never be good enough.

Health Matters – Seasonal Allergies

If you or your child develops a "cold" at the same time every year, seasonal allergies might be to blame. Allergy symptoms usually come on suddenly and last as long as a person is exposed. Symptoms can include sneezing; itchy nose and/or throat; watery, red eyes; nasal congestion; clear, runny nose; coughing; wheezing and shortness of breath.

Allergic reactions occur when outdoor molds release their spores, and trees, grasses and weeds release tiny pollen particles into the air any time between February and October.

But we also need to remember that smoke (campfires in summer, fireplaces in winter); insect bites and stings; chlorine in indoor and outdoor swimming pools; candy ingredients (Halloween, etc.) and pine trees/wreaths (Thanksgiving to Christmas) can also be triggers for an allergic response.

Did you know:

- Tree, grass and weed pollens thrive during cool nights and warm days.
- Molds grow quickly in heat and high humidity.
- In spring and summer (trees and grass), pollen levels are highest in the evening.
- In late summer and early fall (ragweed) pollen levels are highest in the morning.
- Rain washes pollen away, but pollen counts can soar after rainfall.

- On a day with no wind, airborne allergens are grounded.
- When the day is windy and warm, pollen counts surge.

Strategies to minimize your triggers:

- Know which pollens you are sensitive to and monitor pollen and mold counts on weather reports
- Keep windows and doors shut at home and in your car; air conditioning can help; avoid use of window or attic fans.
- Wash hands, take a shower, wash your hair and change your clothes after you've been working or playing outdoors.
- Use a dryer, not a line outside to avoid collecting pollen on clothes
- Wear a filter mask when mowing the lawn or doing other chores outdoors and take appropriate medication beforehand.
- Medicines such as decongestants, antihistamines, and nasal spray steroids are helpful.



