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FROM OUR LEAD Minister

Four years ago next month the elders of St. Andrew's gave a standing ovation when I offered to say "yes" to a call to come and lead a ministry of renewal here. In the time we have been together we have discerned a new shared common Vision, Mission and set of Values that are beginning to inspire the trajectory of this ministry. We are currently working on a strategic plan to pragmatically make this Vision more and more of a visible reality in our congregation and in our city. In recent months we have welcomed new people who are inspired by our Vision of Growing. LIFE. Together. With God—and our mission of being woven into our neighbourhood.

At the centre of my call has been a desire to grow deeper spiritual roots at St. Andrew's — to tap into those springs of living waters we find in Jesus that sustain life and enduring vitality. My aim has been to place at the centre of our ministry — above our individual opinions and wills — the seeking of God's will. I have enjoyed growing greater spiritual leadership capacity among our elders, as well as building a capable and collaborative Staff Team that now brings more of the gifts required for a vital missional ministry. And we're about 60% of the way in this task of renewal at St. Andrew's.

While I had hoped to be here for the remaining 40% of renewal—the Spirit is saying otherwise. As you will already know, it is my intention to respond to a new call that is being extended to me by Oakridge Church in the Presbytery of London, Ontario. Pending presbytery approval, I will complete my work at St. Andrew's at the end of February, just prior to the Annual Congregational Meeting.

What I have learned in the time that I have been with you is that God loves St. Andrew's ministry of **Growing**. LIFE. Together. With God. It's true! What I have observed is that when there has been a need, God has always faithfully provided — despite the litany of fear and anxiety from a few. When we needed help with Pastoral Care, God provided Dr. Geoffrey, with his kind and gentle manner, in the winter of 2020 — thankfully just before COVID started.

When we needed work in the area of our vacant Growth and Care Ministry position — God provided Lori–ann Esser, with her trove of amazing gifts and talents, in the fall of 2021. During the first year of COVID, some worried we'd never make it financially unless we laid off staff — and we completed 2020 with a pocket change deficit of \$934. When people suggested 2021 would be worse financially — we celebrated a surplus of \$32,000! When a pandemic shut down our ministry

God gave us the vision, staff and faithful volunteers to entirely reimagine our ministry online –
 and do it in a top-quality manner that has grown our ministry.

As you prepare to gather for the Annual Congregational Meeting — I pray that you will set fear aside and be confident of God's faithfulness for the future.

God loves the ministry of **Growing. LIFE. Together.**With God.— which in times like ours is more important than ever. In faith, may you make bold decisions for the remaining 40% of renewal work at St. Andrew's, and give your hearts fully to following the Spirit's life-giving lead and guidance.

FROM OUR INTERIM Minister

Gratitude can colour our lives. A Scripture comes to mind: "As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to live your lives in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving" (Colossians 2:6-7, NRSV).

My thoughts as I write this annual report are indeed coloured by gratitude-gratitude for this loving community and staff; gratitude for the gift of life; and gratitude for new light dawning ahead.

It has been a pleasure to continue to serve St. Andrew's during the trying and turbulent year that has just come to an end. With some surprise, I see that it has now been two years since I have been with you. I feel deep respect and affection for people here and feel honoured that I am entrusted to minister with you during times of need and loss. Despite the restrictions caused by health-related concerns, we have been able to offer memorial services to families who had experienced a loss during the year. I was also able to visit people in the hospital.

Pastoral Care Coordinator Judie Coleman and I reviewed all the pastoral care programs in the church and proposed that these be grouped under the umbrella of "Ministries of Care." We met with the convenors of each of the ministries of care operating in the church and asked those leaders how things were going for them. Perhaps unsurprisingly, we heard that our ministries of care leaders would like to find people who share the vision of St. Andrew's and feel called to offer their gifts of caring to our members, friends, and to the wider community. Our model is and always will be Jesus, who gave the first fruits of himself so that the world could experience a foretaste of the Kindom of God.

I am grateful that St. Andrew's has encouraged me in my goal of pursuing a Doctor of Ministry degree, with a focus on Pastoral Care and Counseling. While I might have wished to attend the very beautiful campus of San Francisco Theological Seminary in San Anselmo, California, where my degree program is based, I am nonetheless glad that I have been able to study on Zoom, learning and growing in how I understand Jesus' call to us all. I have now completed all my required courses and am starting on the dissertation phase of my degree. It's both humbling and inspiring to have embarked once again in studies.

Looking ahead, I am hopeful that efforts will be successful this year to attract a suitable ministry candidate to accept the role of Associate Minister, Growth and Care, with this role description: "The Associate Minister of Growth and Care, as a leader of leaders, inspires the congregation to bring its vision to reality through growth in Pastoral Care and Spiritual Guidance, in Faith Formation (Christian Education) and in Engagement of New Members and Leadership Development."

None of us, of course, can know what lies ahead for 2022. I for one choose to be optimistic and to believe that we will emerge from all that ails us with a stronger sense of purpose and mutual love and interconnection.

Life can be rich when we live in faith. As we read in the apocryphal Book of Tobit, "At all times bless the Lord God, and ask him that your ways may be made straight and that all your paths and plans may prosper" (Tobit 4:19, NRSV).

My first Sunday at St. Andrew's was in January of 2020, when Dr. Tim introduced the vision **Growing. Life. Together.**With God. It signaled a turning point for St. Andrew's as the church journeyed on its path of Revision and Renewal.
This sense of "going forward" with hope, a willingness to embark on new adventures with God at the centre, had an impact on me: St. Andrew's was a welcoming place, embracing new people, and it wanted to "go places."
Exciting!

St. Andrew's was ready for new things, prepared for change and growth in different forms. The church was equipped to be truly missional. St. Andrew's was willing to go where God was leading, under the capable leadership of Dr. Tim.

Of course, the pandemic lockdown hit a few short weeks later, and sidelined so many plans and dreams. Not to mention people.

And yet, new plans were born. St. Andrew's began its online ministry, and continued its good works, reimagining its ministries and missions along the way. Dr. Tim and other leaders and congregants have described these responses to the pandemic as "pivoting." Sometimes it was; sometimes I'm sure it was more like doing summersaults and cartwheels with a few handstands thrown in. And so it continues.

Two years later, the pandemic is still here, and so is St. Andrew's – striving to live out its vision and mission. A year ago I spoke at the Annual Congregational Meeting, explaining how St. Andrew's has been planting seeds and I was one example. For me, the seed planted in 2020 grew to my taking on the role of Coordinator Growth and Care in November of 2021. This is but one illustration of what St. Andrew's has been sowing, never mind the gardens that already were established and continue to flourish – even now as winter has a firm grip.

Many things come to mind when I consider what St. Andrew's has planted in the past year. I think of new people and families having discovered St. Andrew's either simply by driving by or through our online services. We have added digital content for children to access on our website. New "postcard" initiatives have reached out to people in Haysboro and Kingsland and beyond. Attending the Haysboro Parade of Holiday

Lights was a means by which to connect with people in our neighbourhood.

The following pages in this report will further highlight the many different ways that St. Andrew's has been Growing. Life. Together. With God. and how we are becoming Woven into our Neighbourhood, Growing Disciples who Love Like Jesus. It is encouraging to read what has been accomplished over the past year. As we continue into 2022, let's keep discerning God's plan for St. Andrew's and the communities that we embrace in Kingsland, Haysboro and South of Fish Creek. Let's continue imagining how we can use our gifts, talents and passions to tend and expand our garden, always keeping God at the centre of our words, actions, ideas and plans.

Throughout 2020 our Session members and teams worked hard to provide meaningful ways to Grow Life Together with God, and to keep our faith family connected with the work of St. Andrew's ~ and with each other.

A few of our 2021 Session highlights:

- We held our Annual Congregational meeting on zoom and still published a 2019 Annual Report that was full of ways we continued to grow life together with God
- Hugh McFadzean agreed to serve as an Alternate Elder to Presbytery
- The Search Team, having been advised that the Session fully supports the hiring of a full time Associate Minister, Growth and Care as a necessary component of St. Andrew's renewal, are actively searching to fill this position.
- Both of our ministers, Dr. Tim Archibald and Rev. Jared Miller, were on medical leave/work reductions in 2021. Session, through our MRA Team (Ministry Resource and Accountability) committed to ensuring that Tim & Joyce, and Jared & Beth received adequate support during this time.
- Session met with several Presbytery Visitation Teams to focus on the health and vocational contentment of our ministers, the calling of an Associate Minister of Growth and Care, and the Creek ministry. The congregation was updated on the results of those meetings throughout the year.
- Session approved 'A Review of St. Andrew's Pastoral Care Programs' by Rev. Dr. Geoffrey Simmins, as a very valuable resource for the new Associate Minister, Growth and Care, as well as the congregation.
- Our Pastoral Care Team have had a name change to 'Ministries of Care'; our Stewards by Design Team have had a name change to 'Gratitude and Generosity'. We think these names better reflect the work of these teams.
- We are learning more about hybrid worship, and trying to ensure that we provide meaningful worship for those present in the Sanctuary, and for those who are participating via our livestreamed services.
- In May, we received the resignation of the Rev. Jared Miller, Associate Minister, Together in Mission effective July 5, 2021. Saying goodbye and expressing thanks for his work and ministry among us was made more difficult with Covid restrictions, but we were able to have a small group of people present in person at Rev. Jared's last service, and present he and Beth with gifts and our thanks.
- This fall, we were pleased to add the Rev. Peter Coutts to the roll of St. Andrew's Church as a professing member under the category of Minister in Association.
- This summer and fall we participated in 3 workshops, focussing on how we better work together on Session, and our roles & responsibilities as elders. These sessions were led by Rev. John Pentland, Ann Yates-Laberge, and Dr. Jean Morris. We are grateful for their leadership and wisdom.

Many of the ministries of Care teams also experienced a name change. In part, this came from the time spent reviewing and updating team mandates and responsibilities to better reflect each of our Ministries of Care.

Everyone can help extend the Ministries of Care

During 2020 and 2021, "doing" pastoral care was difficult. Often, before COVID-19 shut us down, the church grapevine would bring to my attention the needs of congregants. For obvious reasons, during these past two years, that didn't happen as often. So until we are worshipping together in full force, I am relying on everyone to "hear" and to "know". Support

Our Care Share and Family Ministry teams work together to respond to individual needs identified by ministerial staff, elders, office staff and the congregation. We provide short term support in crisis situations requiring food preparation, and/or other specific needs that can be met by a volunteer.

Meal Train

'Meal Train' (www.mealtrain.com) is an easy way to let Care Share volunteers know when meals or individual needs are identified for someone in our faith family.

Here's how it works:

When a need is identified, volunteers who have signed up for this ministry will receive an email with all the details (who is receiving the meals, allergies, delivery instructions, and dates meals are needed). As a volunteer, when you receive the email, you decide if you can help and select a date that works for you. It is an easy and effective way to organize meal delivery, and it is convenient for volunteers to sign up to deliver meals. During Covid, volunteers leave their meal on the recipient's porch in a cooler, so that there is very limited contact. Besides making meals, volunteers can also choose to give restaurant gift cards, Skip the Dishes, or ATCO Blue Flame meals.

Why we help

Since the earliest days of the church, compassionate practical service has been a central component of the Christian faith community. The Gospels have stories of Jesus feeding hungry people, helping the sick, comforting the struggling. The book of Acts describes devout believers being consecrated to the task of overseeing food distribution to those who need it. Our Care Share and Family Ministry teams at St. Andrew's provide a means of continuing this same practical, caring service. Food is provided, support is given, immediate needs are met, relationships enhanced, and some concerns eased. Givers and receivers are both blessed in the sharing.

Facts

In 2021, there were 4 family unit recipients with a total of 25 family meals provided. Thank you, volunteers, for your willingness to help!

Ministry RESOURCE & ACCOUNTABILITY

As reported in the 2020 annual report, MRA's goal in 2021 was to update and clarify the mandate for this team, and this work has now been completed. We wish to acknowledge the support of the General Presbyter, the Rev. Dr. Jean Morris, for her support, wisdom and guidance during the process.

Our new Terms of Reference are provided here to help everyone better understand MRA's purpose and the scope of its responsibilities.

Ministry Resource & Accountability Terms of Reference

The Ministry Resource and Accountability Team is a team of 3 – 4 elders providing support to all Ministers of Word and Sacrament serving in a called position at St. Andrew's.

Responsibilities:

1. Be a resource to assist St. Andrew's ministers in fulfilling the roles and responsibilities of their position descriptions, and in meeting the goals and objectives of their Session-approved ministry plans

- 2. Conduct the Lead Minister's annual review
- 3. Assist the Lead Minister, as requested, in his/her annual review of Associate Ministers
- 4. Assist the Lead Minister, as requested, in his/her ongoing role of supervising Associate Ministers
- 5. Meet quarterly or for emergent issues
- 6. Provide constructive feedback from Session and congregation for ongoing ministry
- 7. Support the ongoing health and well-being of St. Andrew's ministers
- 8. Approve vacation leave, in consultation with the Lead Minister, and discuss study leave requests
- 9. Provide regular reports to Session
- 10. Prepare a brief review of yearly activities for the annual report

The Ministry Resource and Accountability Team will:

- I. Include three to four elders, with recognized gifts to achieve the responsibilities, appointed by Session in consultation with the General Presbyter
- II. Include all called Ministers of Word and Sacrament at St. Andrew's
- III. Require individual members to serve a 3-year term, with at least one member rotating off each year and no more than 2 leaving in a given year when there are 4 members serving on the team

In 2021 Presbytery recommended to Session that MRA research and develop a 360-review process for use when annually reviewing the Lead Minister's Session-approved work plan. Significant work on that has begun and will hopefully be completed early in 2022. Again, we wish to thank Jean Morris for her guidance and support.

Ensuring our ministers have a good, healthy work-life balance is critical and so it is important we meet regularly as a team for discussion and to take appropriate steps as may be necessary to address any concerns. Each and every one of us has a responsibility to ensure our ministers have what they need to fulfill their call to serve the people of St. Andrew's with joy and enthusiasm! This is how we **Grow LIFE Together with God**. We should not accept anything less.

Small but mighty, the Mission Team, under new Team Leader, Judy McKearney, has been working at living out St. Andrew's vision and mission. Besides Judy, the Mission Team currently is made up of members Bill Judd, Brian Hawco and Brent Harding.

In October, as part of its desire to pursue reconciliation with our Indigenous neighbours, the Mission Team invited Indigenous Elders to come to St. Andrew's to give their testimony about the effect that Residential Schools have had on their lives and their families. Hearing about these direct Residential Schools experiences was emotional and impactful. The Mission Team is planning to follow up on this event, continuing to help St. Andrew's work towards reconciliation throughout 2022.

On December 18, 2021, the Mission Team furthered its intention to be "woven into the neighbourhood" by providing hot chocolate (compliments of Tim Horton's Braeside) and candy canes for people coming to skate and enjoy the firepit at the Community Centre during the Haysboro Festival of Holiday Lights. We also handed out "Come Home for Christmas" postcards, which noted the many services that St. Andrew's offered during Advent and throughout the Christmas season. It was a fun evening and a great way for St. Andrew's to be involved in the community and for us to make connections with people and families in the neighbourhood.

The "Come Home for Christmas" postcards also were hand-delivered to many houses near the church in both Haysboro and Kingsland as part of our "neighbouring" efforts.

Throughout December the Mission Team campaigned to raise funds for Claire House. Claire House is located

in Kingsland and is an apartment complex providing housing for singles and small families who might otherwise be homeless. Thanks to the generosity of our St. Andrew's family, we raised \$3000 that allowed us to buy sixty \$50 gift cards as Christmas gifts for Claire House residents.

St. Andrew's also continued its work in 2021 through the Food Bank's Heritage Depot, now entering its fifth year of delivering food hampers every Saturday.

A warm thank you is extended to Jayne and Amelia Martin who, after years of leadership, finished their service at the end of December. We express appreciation to Lucy Aburto, Sheri Coutts and Joan Rowe who have stepped in as Team Captains so that the Heritage Depot can continue to serve clients. We also thank Bill Judd for his continuing leadership and the many volunteers who faithfully work to fulfill this mission.

Finally, we would like to highlight Lynn Judd's efforts to support Afghan refugees settling in Calgary. In this mission, she has campaigned for donations of household goods to WINS and grocery gift card donations.

This work also continues into 2022.

As we further explore ways to be a truly missional church, we invite people of all ages to join our Mission Team. We look forward to your ideas and enthusiasm as we live out St. Andrew's vision and mission in our neighbourhoods – and beyond.

This year, the Personnel Team was charged with providing an Office Efficiencies Report to the Finance Team and Session. This was accomplished in the fall. The report detailed the work performed by our office staff which is exemplary and reminded all readers as to their worth.

Another outcome of the report, and the process of writing it, was a recognition of the need for greater understanding and communication between Finance and Personnel teams. The follow-up action is that the convener of the Personnel committee (or designate if she is not available) will attend Finance team meetings in order to develop better communication and awareness between these two groups.

The team began an in-depth examination of the roles of all the non-ministerial staff and is also developing an updated process for evaluation of their performance. This process may sound dry and tedious, but there is a greater intent with regard to the Vision and Mission of St. Andrew's.

The Personnel Team is active in the area of "Life and Vision" at St. Andrew's. We provide the behind-the-scene supports necessary to ensure that the staff

members, who are not in the ministerial stream, know they are valued in the running of our church.

Every member of the staff at St. Andrew's should have opportunities to Grow within their own area of work. We help achieve this by collaborating with them to clearly define their roles, strengths and goals for the work they are charged with.

Every member of our staff is integral to the Life of our church: it would not run without their skills, time, effort and faith. We try to ensure that they feel appreciated in their endeavours and that they receive appropriate compensation for their work.

Every member of our staff works Together as part of the team that makes St. Andrew's function smoothly. We try to help them know that they are an integrated part of the whole.

All the work provided by the staff of St. Andrew's has an end result of glorifying God and providing ministry to this effect. The Personnel Team helps them be a conduit to achieve this with God in their ministry, sharing this goodness with others.

Re-opening TASK FORCE

St. Andrew's held its last pre-Covid in-person worship service in March 2020. Online services started the next week. Dr. Tim Archibald requested the establishment of a committee to prepare for the reopening of St. Andrew's and to ensure that any church activity would be compliant with Covid protocols. The St. Andrew's community has been very cooperative

The St. Andrew's community has been very cooperative and respectful for the need to keep everyone in our church community Covid safe.

The Covid Reopening Task Force members are Nick Drinkwater, Dolly Forcade, Lynn Judd, and Mark Rowe. Early in the pandemic, epidemiologists determined that churches can be a major spreader of the coronavirus, so the task force has moved forward cautiously. We have been closely following Provincial regulations and guidelines. These regulations and guidelines have been a minimum standard.

Limited in-person worship resumed in February 2021 with the online services continuing also. Depending on the Calgary Covid situation, capacity has been limited to one-third to one-half of our fire rated capacity.

- While we are no longer requiring worship pre-registration, registration at the entrance is still required.
- With Alberta introducing Vaccine Passports in October 2021, the congregation has been supportive of the vaccination requirement to attend in-person services.
- There is a group of members who have been comfortable with in-person service and another who have preferred online services.
- The church has had a limited re-opening.
 Pew cushions were washed and re-installed this summer. However, many in-person activities have been moved to Zoom.
- Singing in the sanctuary has resumed at this time, albeit with masks. The choir is adjusting what they do based upon the current Covid situation
- The church office has been staffed by Debby or Dolly, but has been open only on a specific needs basis.
- The Omicron variant has presented new challenges including our first reported Covid cases at St. Andrew's in December.

As a caring and loving community, St. Andrew's will move into 2022 continuing to balance the needs of the congregation with the need to be Covid safe.

The ReVision & Renewal Task Force has drawn its focus and inspiration in 2021 from our Vision - Growing. LIFE. Highlights for 2021 included the event Congregational Discernment 2.0 – From Vision to Mission and Values, moderated by the Rev. Dr. Ross Lockhart, Dean of St. Andrew's Hall at VST. Dr. Lockhart helped us learn the potential of our new Mission Statement, Woven into the Neighbourhood, Growing Disciples Who Love Like Jesus and our set of 7 Values for the life of St. Andrew's. -Accepting, Compassionate, Courageous, Generous, Missional, Serving and Welcoming. This was followed by a sermon series by Dr. Tim to help us relate on a deeper level to our Mission Statement and Values.

The R&R Task Force directed its attention to Session Restructure in 2021, with an elder workshop led by Dr. Jean Morris in the fall, and the adoption of a new document entitled Criteria for and Responsibilities of Session Members. There was meaningful discussion on this topic at several Session meetings, including discussions on moving to term eldership, the regular invitation of new elders and the creation of different elder roles.

R&R also began working on strategies, ways of breathing life into our Vision of **Growing**. **LIFE**. **Together**. **with God**. by virtue of specific activities, events, gatherings and educational opportunities related to spiritual growth, mission and community engagement. It is our plan for the congregation to see more of this work on strategies throughout 2022.

We are blessed with the leadership of the Rev. Dr. Tim and faithful members, working hard collectively, to help St. Andrew's live into our Vision and Mission Statement.

STEWARDSHIP, PLANNING & FINANCE Facilities



This has been a busy year for the Facilities Team. Don Koch resigned in late 2020, and I volunteered to lead the team until the end of 2021. A considerable To-Do list was inherited and reviewed by the team, and there were maintenance tasks, contracts, operational systems, and equipment needs to consider. In addition to the regular maintenance functions, new

contracts had to be arranged for the following services:

- Removal of trash, compost and recycling
- Regular Lawn Maintenance
- Fire Alarm system and panel inspections
- Pavement patching in the east parking lot
- Janitorial services
- Quarterly inspection and maintenance of boilers, A/C-heating units, plumbing and sewer installations
- Snow plowing and sidewalk clearance and sanding
- Fire Safety and Evacuation Plan
- · and several others

As the Trinity Hall renovation project was nearing completion, Lorne Kelly agreed to construct new storage cupboards for the back of the hall, and the beautiful result has been in use since the end of October.

As weather improved, metal railings on the east side of the church were sandblasted, doors were sanded. and all received a fresh coat of paint. A donated storage shed was re-assembled on the back lot and painted, and fifteen volunteers gathered one Saturday morning for work, fun and fellowship at the annual spring clean-up.

Discussions about the introduction of a Fire Prevention and Evacuation Plan led to the engagement of a consulting firm, which developed a 40-page policy document. It was approved by the Calgary Fire Department and registered with the City of Calgary.

The St. Andrew's membership is aging, along with the facility, and to avoid major capital costs in the future, a diligent maintenance program is essential. For the past year Facilities has operated with a total of 8 volunteer members; at the start of 2022 that number has shrunk to six. Volunteers with time, knowledge and maintenance skills are dwindling. For their generous support throughout the year, I want to thank Brad Chalmers, Otto deNooij, Danny Duncan, Alfred MacRae, Sean Pepper, Mark Rowe and Brent Werle, plus the faithful members, who would answer my telephone summonses with a cheerful: "Sure, I'll be there . . . "


Currently Doug has been dealing with mostly troubleshooting for the office computers. The office is extremely grateful for his help in this area.

In a period of radical change, 2021 well exceeded even our imaginations! We experienced more change than we could possibly see coming!!

In times of challenge, it becomes even more important to hold fast to our vision, mission and values. As a ministry extension of St. Andrew's, the Creek shares the vision of Growing. Life. Together. With God, and seeks to extend that vision to communities south of Fish Creek. The mission of the Creek is to help people find themselves in the story of God, and to do that in ways that express our values of gentleness, complexity, presence and grace.

The values of the Creek are inspired by the qualities of a creek. As a water source with gently flowing movement, a creek streams through and between communities. We give thanks for Jared's thoughtful, energetic and passionate leadership, Carolyn Jerrard's faithful and creative dedication, and Bob and Lisa Fuenning's active enthusiasm and energy. We are grateful for the enduring expressive and caring gifts of Kim McLachlan and Stephanie

Werle, who took part in the Round Table discussions held by Presbytery over the summer before resigning from the Creek team in October. Remaining members of the Creek Team are Desiree Henrichsen, Stephen Henrichsen, Alice Post and Audrey Cole (liaison to Session).

Before we encountered this deeper season of change, much was accomplished:

Alpha – working together with the Alpha Team at St. Andrew's, the Creek shared in leadership of the Alpha Course in January.

Importantly, the Creek continued to offer After Words worship gatherings, both as small in-person gatherings (safely within applicable Covid restrictions) and as virtual gatherings online. After Words provided the opportunity to deepen fellowship, share in communion, and engage more deeply with the messages introduced in videos on the Creek's YouTube channel.

Food and Faith – in March, the Creek offered its first Food and Faith experience of preparing a meal together online, and sharing in fellowship and faith conversation while eating together.

Via Crucis – one of the most meaningful experiences of the year, Via Crucis "the Way of the Cross" was an interactive outdoor art exhibit that took participants through the fourteen stations of the Cross in a meaningful way. Held outdoors at Fish Creek Provincial Park, Via Crucis was a visible presence in the community, and a public faith practice that invited participation in the outdoor worship service held on Easter Sunday morning.

In November and December, the Creek team successfully offered another Food and Faith event, and together with St. Andrew's, delivered warmth and joy to our communities through the Free Little Mitten Trees. Today the Creek flows on, because the mission of God flows on.

The Guild continued to gather together virtually in 2021. Our focus was to support and encourage each other to remain energized and strong to fulfill our mission for the work of the church, the community and the world.

This year we held on to our tradition of fostering a sense of community within St Andrew's. Generous life continues to flourish at St Andrew's, and God is using the generosity of each person to make a difference for good in someone's life today.

We served together to complement the Valentine's Jazz Concert with Decadent Cheesecake Dessert, we made Soup and Samosas to bring warmth during the cold of winter, and we expanded the No Bazaar? No Problem event with many more choices.

Through the generosity of St Andrew's, we were able to continue reaching out to support others, just as God calls us to do. Many programs within our church and the community were supported though these events totaling \$7800. A few examples include:

- In our neighbourhood, we contributed to the student emergency fund in 5 Calgary Public High schools. These funds can provide, among other things, food and transit passes to students in need.
- We provided lunches on a weekly basis through the Brown Bagging for Calgary's Kids program, to an elementary and junior high school where there is food insecurity among children.

 And we provided monthly dinners at Ronald McDonald house for families from outside the city who have a child receiving medical care.


