Elder Profile - Mark Rowe

Mark grew up as a Methodist in a small town near Houston, Texas. The family home was about $\frac{1}{4}$ of a mile from the Methodist church, and it was an easy walk to the church that he made many times. Mark's parents were very active in the church. Mark's minister in high school and his university chaplain provided needed guidance that kept him connected to the church.

As a new graduate engineer, Mark went to Saudi Arabia for two years. This experience led him to a transfer as an engineer working on a gas plant project in Rocky Mountain House for ten months. A transfer to Calgary gave Mark the chance to meet his wife, Joan. Taking a major gamble, he quit his job with his US employer and went to work in Calgary. Joan and Mark were married in 1982. In 1984 they moved to New Jersey where Mark was working. When the assignment finished, they had an option of going to Houston or coming back to Calgary. Calgary has been home for forty years where they raised their three children: Lindsay, Tim, and Paul. In 1986, with oil prices collapsing, Mark changed jobs. He spent the next 31 years with the City of Calgary and is now retired.

Mark and Joan were members of another church. They were looking for a new church home, tried several churches and settled on St. Andrews. It was a comfortable, welcoming space. Rev. Karl English visited the family at their home and helped them decide that St. Andrews should be their church home. They transferred their membership to St. Andrews in 1998. In 2003, Mark and Joan became Elders at St. Andrew's. Mark has had the same elder visitation district since 2003 and enjoys his elder visits. (Joan retired as an active elder in 2022.)

Mark and Joan were active on the Mission Team. Their high point came in 2008 when St. Andrews decided to send a group to Gulfport, Mississippi to work with the Presbyterian Church USA (PC USA) in their Katrina re-building program. Cathy Millar was a key organizer in Calgary and Mark led the fifteen - person St. Andrews team to Mississippi. It was a great experience. We raised money in part by selling beignets (a New Orleans pastry). They made them on Saturday and sold them on Sunday in the lounge. The congregation was very supportive and generous in their donations to the trip.

The group arrived at the PC USA camp on Easter Sunday. There was a worship service that night with the other Presbyterian groups staying at the camp. Mark's biggest fear was how he would split the group into three teams, getting the correct skill-set mix, and still not upsetting anyone. After the service, the St. Andrews group split into three teams on their own, each team with the correct skill-set mix and without Mark saying a word. Thank you, God. The homeowner of the house Mark's team worked on said that the St. Andrew's team were "his angels." The group has remained actively engaged in St. Andrews and as friends because of this ten-day event.

When the Board of Managers dissolved in 2014, Mark became active in the church finances. He presented five budgets to the congregation and helped restructure the church investments. It was time for a change and Mark resigned in 2019. Since then, he has focused his attention on the Facilities Team, which he enjoys.

God has been a guiding hand in Mark's life when he has had to make major decisions. He admits to making mistakes yet believes in God's grace.



SPIRITUAL MOMENT My Encounter with the Holy - Judie Coleman

Many years back, when Rev. Jan Hazlett was with us, she held a summer prayer service. Several people were asked if they would help with the service, and I agreed to be one of them. Our role was to stand at the front when people who were in need of prayer came forward, and we were to pray over them. Before the service, Rev. Jan encouraged us to pray privately and ask the Holy Spirit to be with us and give us the words to pray. I was nervous; I had never done anything like this before.

At the appropriate time in the service, I moved to the chancel area, ready to pray for whoever came forward. The first person asked for prayer for her particular need. I put my hand on her shoulder and prayed for her softly so that only she could hear me. When she sat down, I felt a bit more confident that God was giving me the words I needed. James 4:8 says "Come near to God and He will come near to you." The second person told me her needs but they were a bit more general. I wondered if I could compose an appropriate prayer without a specific request. As I prayed for her, I put my hand on her shoulder, and that is when it happened.I felt something I had never felt before, an energy that descended on me. It seemed to enter through the top of my head and flow out through my hand to the person standing in front of me as I prayed for her. At first, I didn't know what was happening. I was overwhelmed with a feeling of awe, then a certainty that it was the presence of the Holy Spirit, God's indwelling presence. This happened again with the third person as I prayed. When he sat down, I was in tears. I was shaking. The trembling didn't subside. Rev. Jan said later that she knew something had happened to me but at the time had no idea what I was experiencing. After the service, I asked the last person if he had felt the energy flow into his body while we were praying. I was surprised that he did not! The feeling was so intense that I felt the tingling for several hours after I went home, maybe not as intense, but very present.

Weeks later I spoke with Rev. Kevin Lee about my experience, especially that the person being prayed for did not feel the energy enter his body. Rev. Kevin said that possibly the experience was meant just for me, just at that moment. I now believe that to be true. I participated in another such service a year later but the experience was not duplicated. I believe the Holy Spirit was also present at that second service but there was no need for me to have the same experience.

I do believe if we want to hear from God, we must read God's Word and train our mind toward God's voice. If we want to feel God's touch, we must practice providing God with a sacred space to visit. Being in God's presence does not always mean a dramatic trembling, but it may simply be a comforting presence and being aware of God throughout our day. God can speak to us in so many ways, through scriptures, through people, through preaching, through the worship service, in nature, or through works of art. May you listen and be open to hearing God's voice.

Over the summer, the team met to complete a massive mailout campaign sending hundreds of copies of our profile across Canada in the hopes of reaching the desks of potential candidates. As much of the heavy lifting in terms of organization had already been done by the team, we have moved quickly into the interview process with potential candidates and we continue to pray our discernment process will bring us the candidate we know God is sending to us.

In the coming weeks, The Search Team will continue its interview process hopefully with the aim of bringing any potential candidates to Calgary so we can meet them in person and they, in turn, can discern whether St. Andrew's Calgary is the right fit for them.

Immunizations - Wellness Team

Vaccines have greatly reduced diseases that once routinely killed babies, children and adults. People worldwide still die from diseases that vaccines can help prevent. It is important we stay up-to-date on recommended vaccines. The protection some vaccines provide can fade over time, and we may need additional boosters. In Alberta the last childhood vaccination is given in Grade 9.

TWO MONTHS

- Diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, polio Haemophilus infouenzae type B, hapatitis B
- Pneumococcal
- Rotavirus

FOUR MONTHS

- Diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, polio Haemophilus infouenzae type B, hapatitis B
- Pneumococcal
- Rotavirus
- Meningococcal disease

TWELVE MONTHS

- Pneumococcal
- Meningococcal disease
- Measels, mumps, rubella, chicken pox

EIGHTEEN MONTHS

- Diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, polio Haemophilus infouenzae type B, hapatitis B
- Measels, mumps, rubella, chicken pox

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SIX MONTHS

- Diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, polio Haemophilus infouenzae type B, hapatitis B
- Pneumococcal for high risk children

FOUR YEARS

- Diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, polio Haemophilus infouenzae type B, hapatitis B
- Measels, mumps, rubella, chicken pox (if not given at 18 months)

GRADE 6

- Hepatitis B
- HPV (Human Papillomavirus)

GRADE 9

- Diphtheria
- Tetanus
- Whooping cough
- Meningococcal disease

The influenza and COVID vaccines are available for 6 months and older.

Immunizations, cont'd - Wellness Team

ADULT VACCINATIONS

Flu vaccines have been used since 1945 with excellent safety records. It can reduce the chances of getting sick by up to 60%. You can absolutely not get the flu from the vaccine and is recommended annually.

To prevent pneumonia in adults Prevnar 23 is recommended for adults 55 and over, and at a younger age for those who are immunocompromised. It is a one-time dose for healthy adults, and every five years for high risk individuals. Prevnar 20 may also be recommended for those who are at risk but is not covered by Alberta Health Services.

Protection against shingles (shingrix vaccine) is given in 2 doses 2-6 months apart for ages 50 and older. It is highly recommended but not covered by Alberta Health Services.

DTaP (protection against diphtheria, tetanus, and whooping cough) recommended for adults every 10 years and one dose with every pregnancy.

All individuals should stay up-to-date with COVID-19 vaccines. Moderna is offering a new monovalent vaccine tailored to the current strain now circulating. Pfizer Omicron vaccine is awaiting Health Canada approval to offer additional Covid protection this season. Eligibility is based on length of time since last vaccine or infection (ideally six months prior).

Health Canada has approved the first vaccine for RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus) for adults age 60 and over, but its use may be "limited" during this fall's respiratory virus season. Although the virus is common, older people who are high risk are more likely to become severely ill and require hospitalization. Studies show mortality rates in older adults is six-fold of what you would have in a child under one. RSV season usually starts in late fall and lasts until spring.

Individuals planning to travel to under-developed countries should seek advice of a travel clinic at least 4-6 weeks prior to departure.

May we all have the presence of mind to access recommended vaccinations as needed to prevent unnecessary illness.



Kitchen Renovations -Facilities Team

It has been a long time since renovation was last undertaken in the kitchen area, and comparison with recent improvements in Trinity Hall provided compelling, languishing evidence of an imminent need.

It has been suggested that if you provide food, Presbyterians will actively get involved, and the kitchen is considered the *boiler house and heart* of those many gastronomic church activities that take place. Those events include the annual bazaar, barbecues, school lunch programs, Side by Side meals, monthly Seniors' lunches, social events and many more. The kitchen is also considered a prime fund-raising facility, and the Facilities Team determined the time had arrived to roll up sleeves and get to work.

Project financing was provided by contributions from St Andrew's Legacy Fund and Ladies Guild. In order to get the project underway, a committee of Ladies Guild and Facility Team members was formed to determine priority needs. Team members were:

Work commenced mid-April and concluded in mid-August, while working around access limitations due to election use, funerals and regular activities. The following improvements were identified and undertaken:

- Removal, renovation and painting of ceiling tiles.
- Improved ceiling lighting and new under-counter task lighting.
- New stainless steel island countertop and replacement of remaining laminate countertops.
- New kitchen sink faucet with spray nozzle attachment.
- Wall tiles added behind spray-wash and dish washer stations.
- New wall paint.
- Refinishing of all cabinet doors, drawer fronts and hardware.
- Stripping and refinishing of floor tiles.
- Deep cleaning of all kitchen cupboards and equipment.
