#### ELDER PROFILE Judie Coleman

Judie grew up just outside Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Until she was eight, she attended a Lutheran church with her mother and siblings, after which they became members of the Baptist church. As a teenager, Judie regularly attended Youth for Christ meetings, and they had a big influence on her development as a Christian.


Judie and her husband Fred moved to Calgary in 1967 when Fred was transferred by his employer, Chevron Geophysical. They rented an apartment behind the old Holy Cross Hospital along the Elbow River where it was fun to watch the muskrats, kingfishers and ducks from their balcony in the summer and to ice skate on the river in the winter. At that time they attended Grace Presbyterian. They were transferred to Mississippi and Texas for several years, until Fred's company brought them back to Calgary in 1972. St. Andrew's was the closest Presbyterian Church to their new home, so they decided to visit, finding it a warm and welcoming community. Judie worked in the church office for close to 14 years in various roles and with various ministers, and retired as Office Administrator in 2009. She and Fred have two children, Steve and Sarah, and three grandchildren, Caleb, Ashlyn and Riley. When not involved at the church, she enjoys reading, crossword puzzles, playing Wordle and going out for lunch with friends – her favourite hobby.



On April 29, 1990, Judie was elected to the Session, and is one of the longest-serving elders. Over time she served on Mission and Outreach, Invitation and Welcome, and Worship teams. Supporting numerous initiatives by Session and congregation, Judie was part of the group that created many of the banners that are displayed in the sanctuary during the year, and has been involved with the newsletter since the early days when it was called News from the Pews. When she retired, Judie took on the role of Ministries of Care Coordinator, and has been serving in that capacity for the past 15 years. Under the Ministries of Care umbrella are eleven different care ministries, including Judie's hands-on involvement as the co-coordinator of Side by Side, and co-facilitator of GriefShare. She recently served on the Search Team that resulted in the call to the Rev. Laurie.

Judie values her time on Session, and believes that she has grown in faith and in commitment to the church over the years. So many worship services have been meaningful for her, and she is grateful that each minister has brought something special to St. Andrew's. Her long-time Session membership has allowed her a unique inclusion in decades of change and development at St. Andrew's.

### Finance Team Report

#### **Sustainability Fund**

Financial viability is a continuous process at St. Andrew's. This article further discusses the Sustainability Fund, which was introduced and outlined more fully at the Annual Congregational Meeting on March 10, 2024. We would encourage you to take a moment and read the terms [CLICK HERE] which describe what it is, how it is funded, the decision-making process for any expenditures from this fund, and the accounting housekeeping to ensure transparency and accountability. #### Why do we need this fund?

- It is an important financial resource which allows us to sustain St. Andrew's over the long term so that it can carry out its mission.
- It provides the financial agility to react to unexpected financial setbacks and avoid incurring debt -- a status we currently enjoy and guard. A recent example was the stress caused by the Covid situation.
- This agility may also be beneficial in allowing us to respond to any new (and as yet, unknown) opportunities.
- Partners want to know that their counterparts are viable over the long haul. As we continue to seek out
  and develop initiatives in furtherance of St. Andrews' mission, that demonstrated financial stability could
  be a key factor to qualify for grants, matching funds or third party gifts where we need to demonstrate
  our financial wherewithal as a condition of such funding.
- Finally, it is not intended that the Sustainability Fund replace or reduce the need for all of us to support St. Andrew's through annual stewardship.

#### We have the Legacy Fund. Why do we need this one?

The Legacy Fund is an endowed fund which means that only the earnings can be spent and only in the three permitted categories -- our Mission, our Worship and Ministry, and our Facility. Absent a donor designation, these are treated equally; i.e., about 1/3 of the available earnings are spent in each category.

The Sustainability Fund is not endowed (but will be invested) which means any of those funds can be utilized in appropriate circumstances. The fund is intentionally designed to have maximum flexibility, and the Session is charged with ensuring any expenditures from this fund are prudent.

The Sustainability Fund is funded mainly from surplus unrestricted operating funds. However, the Legacy Fund and Sustainability Fund offer two wonderful choices for potential donors to consider in their own gifting decisions.

#### Gratitude & Generosity

The following pages contain some tables and resulting graphs to help us draw conclusions about the trends in donations to the General Fund over a 5 year period from 2019 to 2023.

Our Gratitude and Generosity Team offers the congregation of St. Andrew's the following thoughts:

- 1. Although the numbers of donors have declined over 4 years from 275 to 187, those remaining and the new donors have largely offset the decline of 32% in donor numbers to minimize the decline in general fund donation dollars by only 8% (\$447K to \$412K)
- 2. We are grateful for the congregation responding to our challenges, both in response to the general fund and in special donations to other funds that have been established. In particular we note the 62% increase in the number of donors exceeding \$400 per month in General Fund donations. (from 16 to 26 donors)
- 3. The challenge ahead is to continue to share the message of Gratitude and Generosity, grow our congregation with the assistance of a new "Welcome and Connections Team" and become even more effective in our mission of being "woven into the neighbourhood, growing disciples who love like Jesus".

Please prayerfully review the tables and graphs, discuss them in any manner you think appropriate and take any action your heart feels necessary.






#### Total Annual Donations from each category of Monthly General Fund Donations





#### Ronald McDonald House Blessings

In January of 2019 my family was living in Niverville, Manitoba. Niverville is roughly 15-20 minutes south on the highway from Winnipeg. It was at this time Andreas underwent surgery at the Winnipeg Children's Hospital to correct a premature fusion of his lambdoid suture due to a condition called craniosynostosis. He was in the hospital for four nights. As we were residing out of town at the time, we had the opportunity to access supports from Ronald McDonald House Charities (RMHC) in Manitoba. I'm not sure what we would have done without them! RMHC provides families with a place to stay, where they can sleep, enjoy home cooked meals, do laundry, be supported by other families, and receive the care that can help make their journey a little easier.


#### A Cup of God's Comfort

Someone who is grieving might think, "GriefShare – what an odd name for a group. Why would anyone want to share their grief? Grief is personal, private. People don't need to know how much pain I'm going through. No one else seems to have problems when they lose someone."

With permission of the author Becky Holland, I'd like to share the PresbyCan Daily Devotional from the PCC:

The first line of the email read: "Have you ever felt the weight of the world pressing in, drowning out the gentle whispers of God's love?" It was an email from a Christian clothing company, so I figured that it was some kind of pitch for a new brand of apparel that they were selling. I was wrong. It was a short devotional of encouragement for the reader. There was no sales ad embedded in the email, but there were two Scriptures that were unexpectedly applicable to my life.

Zephaniah 3:17 – The Lord your God is in your midst, a mighty one who will save; he will rejoice over you with gladness; he will quiet you by his love; he will exult over you with loud singing. (ESV)



Psalm 23:1-3 – The Lord is my shepherd; I have what I need. He lets me lie down in green pastures; he leads me beside quiet waters. He renews my life; he leads me along the right paths for his name's sake. (CSB)

Life changed for me and my family in August, 2023, when my daddy died. It was sudden and unexpected, as we were unaware that he had the lung disease that took over. Grief wrapped around us, as it does anyone who experiences the loss of a loved one.

In these two passages, particularly the one from Zephaniah — "he will quiet you by his love" — I found the best promises of God. He is not quieting us by making us not speak, but by helping us to be at peace. Other translations speak of how God offers us rest and a spirit of calmness: "He will renew you with His love" (ISV) and "he'll calm you with his love." (MSG)

Be it sadness from the loss of a loved one, or for other reasons, we have hope that all will turn out to be okay, as God's plans are for us to have peace and to prosper. (Jeremiah 29:11)

My dad loved coffee. He found something comforting in sitting down with a cup of coffee at the table or at his desk. The cup of coffee was a cup of comfort for him.

Let us rely on God to be our cup of comfort whenever we need it, no matter where we are.

Back in the early 80's we lived in the town of Beaumont, Alberta, which is located on the outskirts of Edmonton. Beaumont had a population of approximately 1,200 people, and it was predominantly a French-speaking and Catholic Community. I was a busy young wife in a new home, and a stay-at-home mother with a baby and two toddlers.

One morning I noticed a poster in our Post Office announcing that there was interest in starting a United Church congregation in our town. While reading it, I sensed a deep urge to attend the meeting. As busy and content as my life was, I felt drawn to this initial gathering. There were four other people that showed up to learn more, one being a talented pianist.

We heard a representative from "New Church Development" with the United Church speak about the opportunity of starting a church group. We would have the availability of Sunday Supply ministers, a generous offering of funds, as well as contributions of hymn books, choir gowns etc. from established congregations in the area.

Leaving that meeting, we felt enthused! Strangers quickly became dear friends as we worked and dreamed together. The Beaumont United Church was born! We were offered a meeting space in the town's Elementary School, and each Sunday we transformed the gymnasium into a warm welcoming place of worship. Those days I was out most evenings with Council meetings, fund raising activities, and choir practice.

We left Beaumont in 1988 with a transfer to Calgary. I promised my husband, Blaine that I would just sit in the pew as a parishioner, and a month after attending Southwood United I was approached to sit on their council, which I did for 32 years. That God-directed fulfilling experience was the start of an exciting faith journey that continues to this day!

God taps us on the shoulder when it's least expected, and we answer "Here I Am, Lord!"
